# Board Meeting Minutes May 12, 2005

Board Members Present: Ruth Felty, Kitty Janiga, Mary Mc Carthy, Sylvia Jolet, Dea Jae Shore, Judith Miller, Lois Beauchamp, Barbara Gilstad, and Teresa Tijerina.

<u>President</u>: The meeting was called to order at 5:10. The Board Meeting Minutes were approved as published. Kolodzie Harper was nominated to receive a Calico Rose for her work on many quilt projects.

<u>President Pro Tem</u>: The Safetysite storage in Selma was visited. Lois moved to purchase five archival boxes for the storage of the permanent collection of quilts, Dea Jae seconded and the motion passed.

<u>Secretary</u>: Thirteen calls were received on the guild's phone line this month, all calls were returned. As of this meeting, minutes of the board and general meetings will be in the form of an e-mail to all board members.

Treasurer: Operating Fund \$7,859.61, Reserve \$46,289.55 and Total \$54,149.16. As of this meeting, the Treasurer's Report will be in the form of an e-mail to all board members. Lois moved to choose the Auction to charge sales tax, the motion was seconded and passed. Kitty moved that the price of a quilt sold at the auction will include sales tax, Sylvia seconded and the motion passed. It was decided to research and consult with a State tax expert on the proper collection of sales tax.

Barbara moved to provide the Chair of Bright Hopes with an advance on her annual budget to purchase materials, Lois seconded and the motion passed.

Sylvia moved to discuss issues, presented at the general meeting for approval, at the following board meeting to assure we are in compliance with by-laws of the guild, the motion was seconded and passed.

Newsletter: Of the total entries received to name the Newsletter, four have been chosen and they are to be presented at the general meeting for voting by members. Copies of the 2005 Directory will be available for pick up at the meeting. Copies not picked up will be mailed.

<u>Programs</u>: Members continue to organize the Silver Anniversary celebration, past presidents have been invited, our quilt collection will be displayed and "Reflections" will be read by members.

<u>Community Outreach</u>: There will be sign-up sheets for the Folk Life Festival at the Retreat Table on Saturday.

Unfinished Business: The (Cash or Quilt) Donation Policy was discussed and tabled for the next meeting. Announcement: The committee planning the Ethel Y. Howey tribute presented their report. The word "scholarship" was dropped from the title. A program charter draft was presented and discussed, Ruth will take it back to members with suggested revisions and it is expected to be presented to the board in July.

# **Bright Hopes**





# **Auction Boutique Rules**

Each item is to be listed on the inventory sheet provided to you by the Boutique Chairperson. If there is more than one of an item, each should be listed on a separate line. Each item should have a detachable tag with the number from the inventory list, the consignee's initials

(3 letters), an identifying name (i.e. Potholder), which corresponds to the name on the inventory list and the price. On the day of the sale, the tag will be removed from the item when it is purchased. These tags are then used to determine what was sold and how much is owed to each consignee. You are encouraged to deliver your items and inventory sheet to the Boutique Chairperson at the June guild meeting. You may also deliver your items and inventory sheet to the Boutique Chairperson between 08:00 and 10:30 on the day of the auction. After 10:30, no items will be accepted for the boutique. Prices must be set in whole dollar amounts and this price will include sales tax (\$1.00, \$2.00.... up to \$50.00). The guild will receive 20 % of all sales. Please remember this is a Boutique of Quilt related items and crafts. This is not a garage sale. The Boutique committee will refuse any items deemed unsuitable for the Boutique. The guild is not responsible for lost items or any items that "disappear". Consignees must pick up all items that do not sell at the end of the auction. Your inventory sheet will be used to allow you to remove your unsold items from the boutique area and to figure the amount of money you will receive from your items that sell. Your inventory sheets will not be returned to you. All items that are not picked up at the end of the auction will be donated to charity.

Beverly Orbelo, a guild co-founder, met with him and was granted permission to duplicate the poster with a real quilt. The finished quilt was presented to the Institute in 1984. It has been a constant source of amusemnt in that casual viewers of the poster assume it was copied from the quilt ...not vice versa.

#### **Bonnie McCoy**

One of our first show & tell quilters shared her quilt and this story. She had a bag of scraps and she wanted to make a baby quilt. When she finished she had her quilt - and **three** bags of scraps.

#### **Larry Beauchamp**

Over these 25 years we have had some 300 programs that have featured all kinds of quilters...from our members demonstarting their skills to nationally and internationally known quitling names. Some programs have excited me more tha others but there are noe that I can say, "I wish we hadn't had that."

We have had some now famous teachers for workshops in our quilt guild. Roberta Horton taught her stained glass quilting here, after one of her students brought the technique to her. Judy Matheson taught her wood puzzle quiltbefore she started her now famous compass designs. Margaret Miller brought us her strips that sizzle class and Lynn Taylor Young taught us to make her wonderufl strip pieced, cut and resewn fabric that we turned into coats or jackets. I have had people stop me to compliment me on my coat! What a wonderful ego builder!

#### **Laura Matkins**

There are 15-20 quilters who have dream job. We are quilters at the Institute of Texan Cultures!

We have talked to thousands of school children of all ages. Some who are deaf, some are blind, or maybe disabled in some way. There have been untold numbers of service men and women who come from the Defense Language Institute at Lackland who come once a month. They come to interact with other people and especially to better learn the English language. This is quite a challenge sometimes. Nearly all people want to tell about their mother, grandmother, aunt or ther person who quilted or still quilts. We **tactfully** correct people who think quilting is a dying art. ## Quilt Show 2005 "A Garden of Quilts"



I trust that everyone is getting their beautiful quilts ready for the September Quilt Show! Entering your work not only gives you the opportunity to share your work with others, but you can also receive specific comments about your quilt design and workmanship that will help you to improve your skills. If you have been quilting for awhile it is time to take the next step of having your quilt evaluated by a professional quilt judge.

**Read all Rules.** Take time to read all rules. Take care in completing the entry form with all pertinent information. A color photo is required with your entry for identification purposes and floor plan placement. Work in progress photos are acceptable and early entries are encouraged. Please be sure to have your entries to Janet Miller the by July 16,<sup>th</sup> 2005 deadline. Late entries will not be accepted.

We are asking you to include a SASE this year. The show team will be sending you a letter in early August reminding you of important dates and times for quilt delivery and events.

It is important that your quilt arrives to the show site ready for display. Quilts should be clean and free of stains and odors. Some judges will not ribbon a quilt if it is soiled or has a strong odor as they consider it not "Show ready." The proper sleeves should be attached for both large and small quilts. Cover your name by basting a piece of muslin over your name for fairness in judging.

**Chose the correct category.** Take care in selecting the correct category for your quilt. Generally, no matter how wonderful your piece is, if it is not in the correct category it will not win a ribbon.

If your quilt was constructed, quilted or worked on by anyone but yourself, you must enter it into one of the group or two-person categories. It is also your obligation to give credit to the other person(s) who worked on the piece. It is important to recognize the quilter who enhanced the quilt top with beautiful quilting. Should your quilt be made from a block of the month or kit it should be entered into the "Kit" category.

Miniatures tend to be a problematic area. Miniatures are not just small quilts. Miniatures should be a tiny scaled representation of a large quilt. They should be miniature in both design and construction to include piecing, appliqué, and scale of fabric, quilting design, borders and binding.

Art quilts are those quilts which explore emotions through ideas, materials or construction. The piece should be an original design and may feature abstract and "cutting edge work."

This is a great time to interact with the public by answering questions, demonstrating the craft and sharing quilt stories. Since shortly after the GSAQG was founded in 1980 there has been a complement of quilters volunteering on a weekly basis at the ITC. From Tuesday through Friday

they can be found around the quilt frame on the main floor of the building near the spinners and weavers. As they work on a quilt they explain their tools, quilting methods and styles, give advice on caring for quilts new and old, and warmly encourage beginning quilters to seek help and advice from local quilt shops. Although they are not allowed to sell tickets to guild events they do promote GSAQG activities to anyone who displays an interest. They also relate information about American and Texan history and the movement of pioneers westward and explain how quilting came to be widespread.

The chair of the ITC quilters committee is Lucille Shean. Lucille has been a part of this committee for many years and works with a core group of dedicated and talented quilters. Each member of the committee has a turn at putting her quilt top in the frame for all of the



others to work on. At least one quilt a year is completed for the guild's use. Last year this committee accumulated about 1500 service hours by demonstrating the art of quilting.

Any guild member who hand quilts and has an interest in joining the ITC Quilters is welcome. Docent training is required as well as a security background check. Once accepted as a docent it is expected that three hours per week will be spent quilting at the ITC. Lucille Shean would love to expand this committee. Charter member Donna Semmes recently had a double mastectomy. She is now having chemotherapy.




