### Board Meeting Minutes July 7, 2005

Board Members Present: Ruth Felty, Mary Mc Carthy, Sylvia Jolet, Dea Jae Shore, Judith Miller, Lois Beauchamp, Barbara Gilstad, and Teresa Tijerina. Kitty Janiga was absent.

<u>President</u>: The meeting was called to order at 5:15. The June Board Meeting Minutes were approved as published. Amy Cottrell was nominated to receive a Calico Rose for her work on finding and nurturing vendors for the September Quilt Show. Stephanie Martin will be asked to present a detailed proposal on the selling of old donated quilt magazines at regular meetings.

<u>Treasurer</u>: A final report will be e-mailed to the board, only a draft was available at this meeting. A Certificate of Deposit was purchased for \$20,000 for a 2-year term.

Special Events: Auction Chair, Holly Nelson, reported a net profit of \$2,423.44. Sylvia will review previous Auction records to compare profits. Amy Cottrell reports she has had huge vendor interest and has a total of 45 vendors to date. The Retreat was very successful, there were 35 quilters in attendance.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Members of the Board were asked if research was done on the "missing quilt." This item is to be reviewed at the next meeting.

To avoid missing items for the newsletterer, we are reminded to submit data according to deadlines set, use the confirmation of e-mail tool, use spell-check before submitting articles and be certain all copies are press-ready. In August, the front page of the newsletter will feature the Quilt Show instead of an editorial by the president.

The interest level to the Block Party is low and a motion was made to hold the Block Party quarterly, Judith seconded and the motion passed.

President Pro Tem: A large number of items including fabric, kits, quilt tops, books, magazines, etc. have been donated to the GSAQG. A motion was made to form a committee which will consist of Lois Beauchamp, Shirley Carter and Marilyn Bellows to make disposition of all items, Sylvia seconded and the motion passed.

<u>Secretary</u>: Six calls were received on the guild's phone line this month, all calls were returned.

Programs: Report deferred due to Kitty's absence.
Community Outreach: An e-mail was received from Linda Abati, Librarian, St. Mary's Hall, expressing interest in spotlighting the GSAQG Storybooks and Quilts to Go project in a book she is writing for school librarians. In addition, Barbara Gilstad and Linda are submitting a proposal to present the guild's storybook and quilts project at a meeting for librarians at Region 20 in September. Betty Tope is currently documenting the collection of quilt blocks and quilts used during Community Education presentations at local elementary schools.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> The Board will have 4 vacancies at years end. Due to the vacancy in the Parliamentarian office, a volunteer will be needed to serve as chair of the nominating committee. Five volunteers are needed for the committee and if 5 people do not volunteer, the board will need to appoint members. There will be a contest to design a quilt for blocks signed at the 25th Anniversary party. Item tabled for the next meeting.

Policy Statements changes were discussed, Sylvia moved to accept policy changes as presented today and Dea Jae seconded and the motion passed.

# GENERAL MEETING MINUTES July 9, 2005

President: The meeting was called to order at 10:05. June Minutes were approved as published. The Calico Rose this month goes to Amy Cottrell for locating and nurturing vendors for the guilt show.

<u>Services</u>: Ballots were passed out to all members in attendance to vote on a new location to hold our General Meeting. Visitors were asked not to vote. Ballots were picked up and counted before the meeting concluded with the assistance of 3 volunteers. The

official count consisted of: Number of votes cast-104; Necessary for election-52; 82 YES-votes received and 22-NO votes received, and the motion passed. Absentee votes were allowed and none were received. The August meeting will be held at Horizon Church and then expected to be held in September at the new site, which is Saint Andrew Presbyterian Church. A map will be provided in the newsletter. To date, volunteers have not come forward to assist with Magazines and this activity will be suspended through September if no one volunteers. Members interested were asked to contact Kelly Montgomery.

<u>Treasurer</u>: June Report - Operating Fund \$30,751.78, Reserve \$26,368.02, CD \$20,000.00 and Total \$77,119.80.

Special Events: De LeClair reminded members of the Quilt Show-September 16, 17 and 18, money for the quilt raffle is to be turned in to Renee Bradlley, and volunteers are still needed for white gloves. Janice Frankenberger will take any items for the Boutique. Ms. Gabrielle Swain will have 10 quilts on exhibit.

Holly Nelson thanked everyone that volunteered in making the June Auction a success.

Programs: Last month 60-70 Christmas stockings were made. Todays program is by Jan Mueller on Digital Photography. On August 12, Dorothy Williams will present a workshop on vests and rosettes with a kit available for \$5, Kitty has sign-up sheets at her table today. In September, dye specialist Marit Lee Kucera will teach Atmospheric, Echo and Hawaiian dying. The location for the workshop is yet to be determined. In October, Amy Cottrell will be the auctioneer for the Auction Program. Kitty asked for any plastic or wood Coats and Clark spools for the December program.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: Doris Patterson motioned to accept the Ethel E. Howey Grant Program printed in the Common Threads, July issue. All those in favor were asked to vote by show of hand, of which there was a unanimous vote, and the motion was adopted. The first grant will be awarded January 2006 and applications have to be submitted to Doris by November 1, 2005.

New Business: Volunteers were solicited for the Nominating Committee, Tess Weaver volunteered as the Chair along with two members, Shirley Carter and Sharon Ross. Two more individuals are needed.

There were 108 members and seven guests present. Name tag fines collected - \$3.75.


**OCTOBER** Saturday 10/8 UFO auction following the meeting

### Sense of a Goose

When you see geese flying along in "V" formation, you might consider what science has discovered as to why they fly that way: as each bird flaps its wings, it creates an up lift for the bird immediately following. By flying in "V" formation, the whole flock adds at least 71 percent greater flying range than if each bird flew on its own.

People who share a common direction and sense of community can get where they are going more quickly and easily because they are traveling on the thrust of one another.

When a goose falls out of formation, it suddenly feels the drag and resistance of trying to go it alone, and quickly gets back into formation to take advantage of the lifting power of the bird in front.

If we have as much sense as a goose, we will stay in formation with those people who are headed the

same way we are.

When the head goose gets tired, it rotates back in the wing and another goose flies point.

It is sensible to take turns doing demanding jobs, whether with people or with geese flying south.

Geese honk from behind to encourage those up front to keep up their speed.

What messages do we give when we honk from behind?



Finally ... and this is important ... when a goose gets sick or is wounded by gunshot, and falls out of formation, two other geese fall out with that goose and follow it down to lend help and protection. They stay with the fallen goose until it is able to fly or until it dies, and only then do they launch out on their own, or with another formation to catch up with their group.

If we have the sense of a goose, we will stand by










### 2005 Quilt show Sleeve requirement


2005 Quilt Show is near and it is time to complete all your projects for display. This includes the all important hanging sleeve/rod pocket. It is very important that your quilt be displayed safely and in an attractive manner.

All quilts entered into the quilt show must have a 4" rod pocket / hanging sleeve attached, running the entire width of the quilt.

The only exception to the 4" rule is a miniature or a very small quilt, which should have a 2" sleeve or a garment where a sleeve is not required.

Please be aware that the rod pocket is all that supports your quilt during the duration of the show. Therefore the sleeve should be FIRMLY attached with stitches (not basted or pinned).

How to construct a quilt sleeve: Cut a strip of fabric 8.5" wide and the length equal to



the width of your quilt. Make a narrow hem at each end of the strip. With wrong sides together, sew along the long edges using a 1/4" seam allowance to make a fabric tube. Stitch the tube down (top and bottom) to the top of the guilt. The rod goes through the tube, so do not stitch the ends of the tube closed.

We look forward to sharing your work for all to enjoy.

### Meet the 2005 Judges:

### **Nancy Brenan Daniel**

Nancy learned to love quilts from my grandmother, Mary Talkington Ritzenthaler, who encouraged her to play with fabrics and quilts at a very young age. Nancy enjoys quilt making. She loves writing about, designing, and teaching hand quilting, appliqué, color and design, and rotary patchwork techniques.

An art educator for more than 30 years — teaching art education, art history, design and of course — quilt making! Although quilt making and design currently take up much of her time she continues to travel to teach and judge.

Active in the quilt world for many years as a popular teacher and designer Nancy is also the author of more than 20 books on sewing crafts and quilt making. She is a regular contributor to quilting and crafts magazines. Another favorite honor came when her "Flowers of Friendship Quilt" was invited to participate in the National Quilt Festival, Branson Mo, where it earned the Viewers Choice Award and became the cover quilt for their Engagement Calendar. Nancy had the honor and pleasure of judging the International Quilt Festival in 2003.

Nancy is a member of the NQA, Inc. and a NQA Certified Teacher and Certified Quilt Judge. She is active in several local and national quilt guilds and is a Charter Member of the American Quilter's Society and a member of the Museum of the American Quilter's Society.

Kathy writes regular articles for The Appliqué Society Newsletter, The International Machine Quilters Association magazine and other quilt-related magazines and newsletters.

Kathy is a strong supporter of local quilt guilds. She has been an active member of the Ozark Piecemakers Quilt Guild since 1992.

# Youth Alternatives Committee Chair: Jean Powell



Have you ever noticed the basket sitting on the floor near the double doors leading into the guild meeting place? Have you ever wondered why those little bars of soap and miniature bottles of shampoo were being collected?

The Youth Alternatives Committee of the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild is chaired by Jean Powell. She and Carla Schladoer spend an average of three hours per month presorting and packing items donated by members. These are then taken to The Bridge Emergency Shelter which provides a home for up to thirty days for children ages seven to seventeen in crisis situations.

The guild's involvement with The Bridge began about a dozen years ago with a call for donated sewing supplies the children could use to make take-along pillows. The response was immediate and overwhelming. Someone wanted to know if The Bridge could use gently worn clothing, as well. Upon investigation it was learned that The Bridge thrift shop will accept most second-hand items in good condition. - clothing, TV sets, VCRs, holiday decorations, and even furniture. Dona-

tions are sorted carefully on-site with suitable items first being offered to the residents before being placed in the thrift shop. All money from thrift shop sales goes directly to The Bridge.

Because The Bridge operates on a limited budget not much money is able to be allocated for the everyday "luxuries" which most youngsters take for granted. Jean and Carla have been told that the children are especially grateful for hygiene items such as soap, shampoo, and toothbrushes. T-shirts with modern designs are very popular with the children, and things that add a homey touch to their space - like posters and prints - are always happily received. Even things as prosaic as plastic ice-cream tubs are put to use by the children and the adults who care for them.

Jean Powell shares the thank-you notes sent by The Bridge with guild members during announcement time at the monthly meetings. So, if you find yourself with an overflowing drawer of mini-toiletries from hotel stays, a TV set that is no longer being used, furniture that is "too good to throw away" but no longer needed, or a box full of outgrown clothing, please call Jean Powell at 684-6425. You'll be happy knowing your cast-offs have found an appreciative home and that you have helped children in a difficult situation.





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
