The meeting was called to order at 3:05pm by Judith Miller, President ProTem. Other members of board present were Gail Dickman, Sherry Duringer, Linda Ethridge, Carol Bryant, DeaJae Shore and Sylvia Jolet. The minutes of the August 2014 meeting were approved as published. There were 7 calls to the guild's phone during the month requesting general information on the guild. There was no treasurer's report given. The board approved a RoseBud recognition for Carol Bryant for her gift of the machine embroidered Welcome Sign for the Guild meeting entrance.

Carol announced that the 2015 Quilt Show Raffle Quilt is completed and will be unveiled at the Guild Auction on August 27, 2014. There will be approximately 50 quilts completed for the auction. DeaJae reported that the guild pins have been received and will be available at the next guild meeting. Membership renewal will be emphasized at the September, October, and November meetings since there will be no services at the December Party meeting. The board approved a budget of \$30.00 for DeaJae to purchase a new microphone stand.

Gail submitted the budget requests from her committee chairs with all totals the same as last year. There are three committees that need new members or leadership due to resignations. The board discussed ways to involve newer members in these activities. Several board members will gather names of individuals at the general membership meeting who are interested in these areas. They will be contacted at a later date. There are some spaces still available for the Melody Crust workshops in October. The openings will be offered to non-members in order to fill workshops.

Sherry has met with Kitty Janiga, Community Education Committee chair, to discuss revamping and revitalizing this committee. Some very good ideas are forthcoming and a reworked copy will be given to DeaJae for the webpage. Pictures for this effort would be a good addition to recruitment of volunteers

for the speakers' bureau. Sherry submitted her committee budget requests for the coming year. Linda reported that at least one candidate for four of the five upcoming board positions are in. She will continue to search for a candidate for the secretary position.

The Board discussed the possibility of having the guild's mission statement on the website and in the membership directory. There being no further old or new business, the meeting adjourned at 4:15pm.

Budget requests are due now for preparation for presentation to the members in October and voting in November.

Bernie Farris reported that the Show Raffle Quilt is completed and will be unveiled at the Quilt Auction later this month. There are only 14 more fat quarters available of the challenge fabric. Sandra Lowell reported that there is only 1 more space needed for the Houston International Quilt show bus to be a make. There 11 more spaces beyond that available for a full bus. Winter Retreat reservation payments completion deadline is November guild meeting.

DeaJae reminded everyone that membership renewal should be done before the December meeting since no services will be available that month. The renewal deadline is the January 2015 meeting. Avoid the rush and renew early. Rebecca reported plenty room in the Melody Crust workshops. She is taking reservations for these workshops and the mini-retreat in October. The November program will be Karel Donnelly on Machine Quilting on Domestic Machines. Due to the holidays, reservations for the Bonnie Hunter February 2015 program can be made in November.

Gail Dickman and Carol Rouse drew Sandra

Resendez' name as the Golden Carrot winner. Carol reported hat all QPC kits are out. There are some completed tops that need borders if someone will volunteer for this work. Jackie Randal showed a number of DVDs in library available for checkout. Several members have stepped up to take over making the coffee before each guild meeting.

Sherry Duringer announced that Kitty Janiga was participating in the River Arts Fest this morning. As the incoming chair of the Community Education Committee, Kitty has several ideas for the members to offer programs to schools, libraries and nursing homes. She wishes to establish a speaker bureau to offer programs on quilt history, offer quilt trunk show, quilting tool demonstrations. These are just a few of the possibilities. Bright Hopes will have more puzzle kits in the near future. The last Bright Hopes quilt done by Larry Beauchamp was shown to the members. Cathy Wallace showed some brochures for upcoming ITC activities. She noted that each 2nd Sunday there is free admission to the Institute. Linda Kirk reported that there will be books and guilts at 18 schools this fall. The guild members have made 16 new guilts since 2013. She has received a request for Spanish language books and asked for members help locating some. Barbara Sumlin explained the process of the organ donor families block making. As soon as there are sufficient blocks made and turned in another memorial guilt will be made. The committee has 2 or 3 Trauma Quilts completed however the requests for these have diminished and they will hold them in reserve.

Mary McCarthy and Ellen Hernandez continue to interview members for their personal stories on quilt making. Linda Ethridge reported that the candidates for the upcoming elections are: President, Ida Blankenship; 2nd VP, Dea Jae Shore; 4th VP, Jeana Kubik; Treasurer, Cindy Shutt. They are still in need of a candidate for Secretary.

There were 129 members present and 1 guest. New members were presented their membership pins. There was no further old business and no new business. The meeting adjourned at 10:50 a.m.

Community Education

The purpose of this committee is to provide information to the public on quilts and quilters by presenting demos, lectures and other programs to schools, churches, and libraries and at public events. Many people have been doing this on an individual basis when asked to speak at events.

The guild could be much more effective by establishing a speaker's bureau to answer request. Recently, no request as the web site is under construction. Soon it will be functioning

The committee needs members to help outline programs and speeches and generate ideas for the same .Volunteers are also needed to go out to give speeches and demos.

Examples of speeches would be types of quilting, and on specific types of quilting as scrap quilting, crazy quilting, applique, quilted clothing, names of squares, etc.

Examples of demonstration would be trunk shows (CE has about 15 quilts), tools used in modern quilting, hand quilting

Examples of hands on would be yo-yos, simple coasters, coloring of squares, sewing a simple block by hand

Volunteers are also needed to sew samples of blocks using more modern fabrics (current blocks are very dated) --- i.e. 4 patch, drunkards path, Jacobs ladder, bear paws, etc.

Pieces From The Past by Ellen Hernandez

10.14 Pieces of the Past, 54: Ric Rac by Ellen Hernandez



In the 1860s, this delicate collar trim was called waved crochet braid or waved lacet braid. Waved braid was illustrated in The Young Ladies Journal of 1883, recommended as edging. This name later appears as wave braid. The word rickrack in Needlecraft magazine in 1916 was for use as a trim on baby garments, handkerchiefs, towels, and doilies. Other

names associated with this trim were zigzag braid, snake braid, and corrugated braid. The cotton or wool braid became more popular than lace

edges because it withstood the harsh laundry process of the time using boiling water, lye soap, and wooden paddles.




Seamstresses often added delicate cotton crochet to the already interesting ric rac. Two colors of ric rac could be wrapped together to provide a more interesting trim. On close inspection, this daisy is made from carefully folded ric rac.











Today, most ric rac is made of polyester and new colors include variegated and metallic. Sizes go from baby to jumbo. Crafters are still finding interesting ways

to turn ric rac into spectacular items, and are including it more often on quilts.




