Pieces of the past

1.16 Pieces of the Past, 69: Chenille Bedspreads, by Ellen Hernandez



Twelve year old Catherine Evans Whitener of Dalton, GA was intrigued in the 1890s by an antique candlewick bedspread owned by a relative. The design process was similar to 18th century French tufted handwork. Catherine devised her own way to replicate the look developing what would be called *chenille* - French for caterpillar. Her first attempt was an Irish Chain pattern. She sold her first blanket for \$2.50 at a time when men worked all day for \$1.00. To meet the increasing demand for the spreads,



Catherine taught her technique to friends and neighbors. Raised thick tufts of yarn were sewn onto stamped cotton sheets which were washed in hot water to shrink them and lock in the tufts. The first spreads were white on white but colors were added to draw attention to them and the bright peacock was the most popular design. Dalton, on Dixie Highway 41 which linked Ontario to Miami, became known as *Peacock Alley* and *Bedspread Boulevard* because of the many chenille bedspreads displayed for sale to





Soon there were as many as 10,000 chenille makers from GA to TN, NC, and SC who worked at home (later called 'spread houses) where haulers delivered

supplies and returned to pick up finished products which were marketed throughout the country. The workers earned 25 cents/spread. In 1929 up






to 600 spreads were made each day and \$60,000 worth were sold annually to B. Altman in NY. Chenille made B. J. Bandy from Dalton a millionaire when he modernized the manufacturing. Besides bedspreads there were toilet covers and mats, throws, carpets, and clothing. Varsity sports jackets used the chenille tufting for letter patches. When made exclusively from cotton, the tufts could work loose and leave bare fabric, one of the reasons many old bedspreads were discarded. Later, by adding a low melt nylon the yarns could be steamed and set in place. The interest in chenille and auto travel through Dalton.

interest in chenille and auto travel through Dalton faded by the 1950s and Dalton soon became a carpet capital instead.

Quilters today enjoy using vintage or modern chenille for patchwork quilts. Chenille bedspreads are even available again at many stores.


