Ida Blankenship called the meeting to order at 3:05 pm. Those in attendance were Karen Lambdin, Cindy Shutt, Elaine Staller, Dea Jae Shore, Janet Miller, Jeana Kubik, Sherry Duringer, and Linda Ethridge.

The minutes were approved as presented in the newsletter.

The Calico Rose nominee was Melissa Allo for her work with the winter retreat; unanimously approved. **Treasurer** – Cindy Shutt reported a balance of \$69,900.20. The December financials have been checked and approved. The completed budget was in the last newsletter.

**1**<sup>st</sup> **VP for Special Events** – Elaine Staller. Carol Bryant has raffle quilt fabric and kits ready for the Feb. meeting.

Auction – Mary McCarthy sent an expense budget. There was discussion about charging admission. Winter retreat went well and Linda Kirk will be in charge next year.

Summer retreat registration begins this month. Mini-retreat- unknown who will be taking charge. **2**<sup>nd</sup> **VP for Information** – Dea Jae Shore will be handing out directories at the Feb. meeting. There are already 246 renewals for 2016. The web page is now on a new host, which has some improvements, especially for mobile viewing.

There was discussion on how to make membership sign-up and renewals simpler and faster. The membership committee needs extra help in busy months.








### 3.16 Pieces of the Past, 71: Canadian Red Cross Quilts, by Ellen Hernandez



This World War I signature quilt from Waskatenau, Alberta, Canada is evidence that Canadians have long made quilts to support war efforts. Women eagerly responded to the Red Cross fundraising guide published in the December 1917 issue of *Modern Priscilla* magazine by making raffle quilts. The lofty goal was \$1,000 per quilt, the cost of one ambulance, or sheets and blankets for 129 hospital beds. Signatures were sold for 25 cents and then embroidered. This quilt has over 300 signatures including 28 Alberta soldiers and sailors.





During World War II the Red Cross encouraged quilters to again make signature raffle quilts or to donate completed quilts which would be sent to Britain. Canadians responded impressively. Thousands of quilts were sent to Britain over the course of the war to include 25,000 from Nova Scotia in 1944 alone. At first the Red Cross provided the wadding (batting) and striped winceyette (a soft flannel) for the backing. When these supplies ran out, frugal women used clothing, blankets, sheets, and any

other fabrics and scraps available. Young girls in 4-H clubs and youth groups also made quilts. Rainbow, a popular hand quilting pattern was often used, known as the Baptist fan in the US. All the quilts included a small Canadian Red Cross label on the back. However, the quilters could not add their own names. The quilts were distributed to those made homeless from bombings, people forced to relocate, hospitals, day nurseries, and the Canadian Armed Forces stationed in London. Due to the fabric and clothing ration which continued until 1949 the quilts were well used for many years.



Very few of these Canadian quilts or quilters have been located. The Canadian Red Cross Quilt Research Group (CRCQ) of the Quilters' Guild of the British Isles has attempted to record the stories of the quilts. Stella Simmons' house was bombed and had no roof, doors, or windows. Her family used their quilt immediately and she has used it ever since. Pat Staple and her sister slept together in a double bed covered with a crazy quilt of odd fabrics. Doreen Palmer who served in the Voluntary Aid Detachment said that her all her barrack beds had quilts. Evelyn Gardiner, a nurse, said that with heating restrictions the quilts were much appreciated in the nurses' quarters. To date, the CRCQ has documented 179 quilts. A book about their efforts was published, *Comfort from Kindness*.

Note the two books at the end are from our speaker at the January meeting, Sue Nickles. Ms. Nickles donated one book and I purchased the other. And, "Nine Patch" has a special dedication Sherry Derringer's father. All of these books have been inventoried into the database, updated on the web site at Collectorz, and will be available for checkout at the March meeting.

I have decided to step down from being Library chair. Jeana announced it at the February meeting. The book library is responsible for:

- · Bringing a portion of the library to each meeting.
- · Overseeing borrowing of the books by members and updating the database of the activity.
- Contacting members if books are overdue and collecting fines.
- Purchasing books for the library and processing into the database.
- Accepting donations and verifying duplicates against the database. If none, process into the database.
- · Preparing quarterly reports to the board member over Services.

There are other general rules governing the library in the directory. As of this writing, the book library held 1423 books. The Board approved our use of an online service, Collectorz.com, to 1. use a program (by subscription) to maintain a digital database, and 2. upload the database to the Collectorz website (by subscription). Someone on the book library committee should be computer savvy to handle the database and the use of Excel (used to convert the database language to a spreadsheet to create labels). It also helps to know Word to create quarterly reports and articles for the newsletter. The two subscription services cost the committee \$25 per year and have been paid thru 2017. These costs come from the \$300 / year budget set aside for the book library by the Board. Besides some supplies that may be needed throughout the year, the rest of the budget is for books!!!

I will be available to train and transition the services over to a new committee to make the transition as smooth as possible for the general membership. Just let me know if you want to see the collection at the storage, or want to sit at the back with Mary Ruth and I to see how it goes.
