

### 11.16 Pieces of the Past, 79. Quilts of Valor, by Ellen Hernandez



The national non-profit Quilts of Valor (QOV) Foundation was sparked by Catherine Roberts' vivid dream in 2003 while her son was deployed in Iraq. She dreamed he was wrapped in a quilt which gave him a sense of hope in the middle of combat. Catherine quickly gathered a volunteer team to

put her dream into action. She wrote a mission statement for her 'Quilts for Soldiers' which became 'Quilts of Valor' (to include all service branches): 'to cover service members and

veterans touched by war with comforting and healing Quilts of Valor.' She expected her volunteers to construct quality quilts that were machine or hand quilted, and were presented in an honorable way. The first quilt was given Nov 2003 at Walter Reed to a wounded soldier from the Iraq conflict.

There are now volunteer coordinators in every state, including DC. Over 146,000 QOV have been awarded. QOV has a website, an online newsletter, free patterns, and a request form for potential quilt recipients.



Former US Navy WAVE Dorthea Eldridge, 92, who served in Italy during WWII not only received



a QOV, she made one for another female veteran.
Eldridge wanted to enlist after seeing 'Uncle Sam wants YOU' posters but her mother wouldn't allow it. She had to wait until she turned 21 in 1944. In November 2015 Eldridge presented a QOV she made to Linda Phillips, the 50<sup>th</sup> female pilot/instructor ever to serve in the USAF. Phillips was the first female KC135 instructor pilot and served during Desert Shield (while 8 months pregnant.)

One special QOV honored Military Working Dogs and Handlers. Eleanor Frick located a feature fabric honoring military service dogs and used it to make a quilt for Dan Hartley, a Handler in Iraq in 2003. His dog, Cody, worked in temperatures up to 140 degrees

and his paws were often burned from walking in the extreme heat.



Society started in 2006 and have awarded over 7,000 quilts. They present quilts to male and female veterans who served in WWII, Asia, and the Middle East. Victoria Coulter received a quilt on her 102<sup>nd</sup> birthday. Serving in the royal Canadian Air Force during WWII, Coulter decoded messages from the Japanese and relayed them to England.



Marianne Fons (of *Fons and Porter*) is a supporter of QOV and was responsible for encouraging nine fabric companies to design QOV fabrics in 2010. Fons presented the 100,000<sup>th</sup> QOV to Petty Officer Shannon Shepard, USN, at a special ceremony at Walter Reed in 2014.
