Learn several stitches and wool applique techniques. Cost \$35.00 plus kit fee (Fabric, wool, floss and needles to make a 20 in. block) \$23.00 for a total of \$58.00. You can do your own wool if you wish. Class is from 9 am to 4 pm.

Saturday class is scalloped edge quilts. Start with your own quilted 24 x 24 in. project or a 24 in. square of prequilted fabric from a discount store. Use the EZ scallop tool by Darlene Zimmerman. Will need your machine. Cost \$25.00 .

March. Long Arm Quilting. The In's and Out's, Do's and Don'ts.

April. Karen Eckmeier, www.quilted-lizard.com, will be coming to our Guild. Friday class, Collage Workshop, "Happy Villages". No seams to match or piece. Free form cutting. 16 1/2 in. block. Sewing machine optional. Cost \$35.00. Lecture: Oops! My Edges Are Showing. Afternoon class, Large Logs. Start with the traditional log cabin block, use topstitch curves and little triangles to give it a new twist. Wall hanging or table runner. Cost \$25.00. These classes are part of the Eleanor Wright Grant so you will be refunded most of your class payment if you show up for the class.

May. Friday Guild member, Dea Jae Shore, will be teaching a machine quilting class using ruler foot and templates. Class size will be limited to 15 students. You will need your machine and ruler foot. Cost \$35.00. This class is part of the Ethel Howey Grant so your payment will be refunded if you show up. Saturday is Guild Work Day. After the business meeting we will get our machines out and help, various Guild committees get projects done. Lunch will be provided.

2.19 Pieces of the Past, 104: **London Foundling Hospital Tokens**, by Ellen Hernandez

The largest collection of 18th Century common life fabrics comes from an unusual source – The London Foundling Hospital of 1741. After seventeen years of campaigning the children’s home was established in 1739 by seaman Captain Thomas Coram, composer George Handel, and artist William Hogarth, with a Royal Charter from King George II. At the time, the United Kingdom had only one place for *legitimate* foundlings (abandoned children) and orphans, unlike Europe where many Catholic institutions had long been established. Life in the early 1700s was a struggle due to widespread poverty, disease, and pollution. Every year about one thousand babies were abandoned in London alone. There was no place for illegitimate children except the workhouse where mortality was over 90 per cent. Coram was determined to make a difference to provide care and education to the most vulnerable, especially girls. To raise funds for the home, Handel held benefit concerts of his *Messiah*, and Hogarth gathered artists to donate works for gallery displays.



Over 16,000 babies were accepted between 1741 and 1760. They were renamed with no record of their mothers. In case a mother might return to claim her child, they were required to leave a ‘token’, a small object such as buttons, lace, or a piece of fabric to be attached to registration forms. Fabric was often cut from the baby’s or mother’s clothing. Half of the ‘token’ was attached to the form and the other half given to the mother to use in future for identification. By 1790 over 18,000 tokens were filed, after which written receipts were given. Only 152 children



were ever reclaimed. This patchwork of printed and woven fabric with embroidery was cut in half, and nine years later in 1775 Sara Bender used her half patchwork to reclaim her son, Benjamin.



Surprisingly 5,000 textile samples from this 18th Century period have survived. Because most of the mothers were poor the fabric samples are representative of what was available to their class. Their dress was an inexpensive version of fashionable clothing. Fabrics include those almost unknown today – camblet, fustian, susy, cherryderry, and calamanco. There are ribbons, embroidery, and baby clothes, all providing a most unique insight into the daily life of over 270 years ago.

What became of the children? Sadly, almost two thirds from the early years died from infections and epidemics. Babies were sent to country homes where they were fostered by wet nurses until age four. Girls surviving to their mid-teens were apprenticed as servants and boys were sent as laborers or to the Army.

The Hospital Home operated until 1954. Over 25,000 children had resided there. In 2004 the 1930s building built on the original site was turned into the Foundling Museum. Collections include 18th Century art by Hogarth and others, and an archive of Handel’s work. Museum proceeds support *Coram*, a children’s charity.

 - d. Linda Nash is the new chair for Bright Hopes. She wants to start a new Bee with set times and dates to accommodate all who are interested.

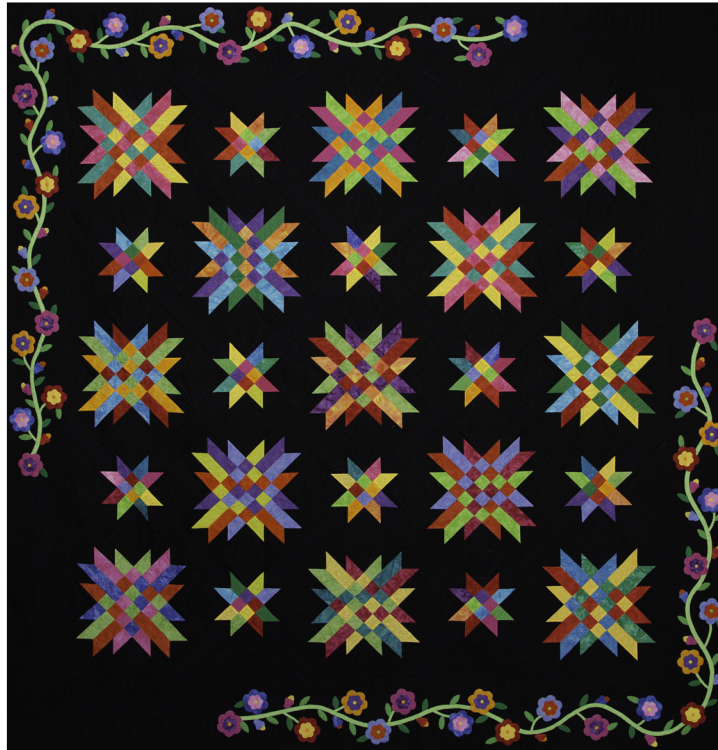
Parliamentarian – Sylvia Jolet ~ No report
