From the Quilts Project Committee (QPC)...



1.20 Pieces of the Past, 117: Rita's Quilt, by Ellen Hernandez



In September 2019 Chicago resident Shannon Downey purchased an unfinished embroidery quilt project (for \$6.) at an estate sale of Rita Smith who had died in August at age 99. The partially finished pieces were of fifty United States with birds and flowers, and fifty blue stars, all on hexagon shaped blocks. The block pieces had been cut and some of the designs had been transferred. Two states had been completed, Georgia and Alaska, for what would be a queen-sized quilt. Believing Rita would have wanted her quilt

completed, Downey vowed to complete it, but reached out to crafters by Instagram. "Anyone interested in helping Rita rest in craft peace?" Over 1,000 people responded in one day. One hundred were chosen, fifty to complete the states and fifty to make the stars. Work was to be completed by 15 November and returned to Downey. Rita loved French knots and volunteers were asked to

include them in each block. Volunteers had touching personal stories about why they were adamant to request a certain state block, such as where their grandmother was from, or where they grew up, etc. In December, Downey, a non-quilter, and thirty-eight local quilters began assembling the blocks by hand. An embroidered state sampler US map made by Rita that Downey had also purchased from the sale (for \$5.) was placed in the center of the quilt.


The quilt project made headline news across the country, featured in major newspapers and news channels. People researched Rita Smith and discovered she was from Michigan and had been a school nurse. Her mother was Canadian, her husband died in 2009, and she had one son, William, who was still alive. He relayed that his mother was always sewing and often reupholstered furniture.

When the quilting is completed, the quilt will be displayed in Chicago on December 21 at a local gallery, *Women Made*. In March 2020 it will be shown at the National Quilting Museum in Paducah, KY. Downey plans on donating the quilt to a museum to honor Rita, her story, and the outstanding community effort made to complete the quilt.

I'm a Gemini. Born under the sign of the twins. That's the astrological equivalent of a schizophrenic with ADD! I know I'm not the only Gemini out there. How can you spot a Gemini quilter? What are the symptoms? What help or solace exists for those who possess this malady?

A Gemini quilter wants to (and actually believes she can) do it all. You name it -- trapunto, paper-piecing, applique, etc. -- a Gemini's projects run the gamut! Her sewing room is crammed with unfinished projects (UFOs) because she is so busy being "all she can be" as soccer mom or working mother or hospital volunteer (or maybe all three)! However, the organized side of her has carefully prepared a numbered list of those UFOs. (I myself have 25!)

Geminis own every new quilting tool on the market. Often we actually purchase as many as three of the same one. That's because we forgot we bought the first one on a whim, so we purchased a second one. The second one got lost somewhere in the fabric-cluttered sewing room. So when we really needed it, we had to go buy a third!

Look around that sewing room. Organizational aids are everywhere! Shelves line the wall. There are clear plastic bins, woven baskets, filing cabinets, rolling carts, and every other organizational device known to mankind! Yet fabric is spilling over into the center of the room (which brings us to symptom number four)!

Geminis do not buy fat quarters. Oh, we may start out looking at fat quarters but the quilter who actually believes she can do it all thinks in terms of YARDAGE. This quilter would never make a small quilted wallhanging. The block is so striking (who cares that it has 64 tiny pieces and inset seams)! The Gemini must make a bed sized quilt! And that fabric is so cute! It is just perfect for the person she has in mind! Furthermore, it will make a wonderful backing. But how much to buy? One yard? No, make it one and a half ... No, wait! How much do I need for a back? If I get two yards for the front and six yards for the back, that ought to cover whatever I decide for this quilt. But wait! There's only another three yards left on the bolt and I can get an extra 10% off. Yeah, go ahead and give me the whole bolt.

Consorting with Geminis can be an intensely exhilarating experience (or so we like to think)! We are enthusiastic, creative, passionate, opinionated, and downright flamboyant! We do our share to keep the quilting stores in business. Our friends will tell you that we're crazy but they like us this way. So keep your eyes peeled at the fabric store this month! Playing "Spot the Gemini" can be an extremely entertaining game! See you on second Saturday!

Wheee! Summer's here! The teachers among us usually spend the end of school and beginning of summer wondering "Did I do enough to prepare my students for the coming year?". I also find myself wondering about "doing enough" from a quilting perspective. So today I've decided to mesh the two together and give you an English literature/quilting lesson.

John Milton, the great 17th century English poet, became blind at the age of 43. A very religious man, Milton wrote some wonderful poems about how we squander the time and talent that the good Lord gives us. In "When I Consider How My Light Is Spent", he worried about having to answer to the Almighty for how he had spent the talents with which he had been blessed. He spoke of the "talent which is death to hide, Lodged . . . useless" inside him. In an age without typewriters, computers, or voice recorders, he still managed to find a way to release his gift for poetry.

We, as quilters, have also been given talents that need to be put to fruitful use. It's easy to say "I don't have time to work on quilts for other people" or "I have too many UFOs to finish before I can start something else!" Many of us are stingy with our time. We want to work on our own projects. But John Milton has got me thinking.

I don't want to wind up with a final tally sheet that says I was stingy and uncharitable with the talent the Lord gave me. It's easy to give things to your family and friends but to give of your stash just because someone you didn't really know needed it – that is true charity.

The idea is to be generous with your time, talent, and stash. There are a variety of ways that you can use your talent and help our guild at the same time. Donate some time to help the Quilt Project Committee (QPC) or the Quilt Project Finishing Committee (QPFC). Make a Bright Hopes quilt or Linus Quilt. Volunteer to serve in some guild position that needs filling. Look around you! The opportunities are endless to make a difference in our guild, our city, and our world.

This is not a TOTALLY selfless act. In the process, you will be clearing out some fabric from your overflowing stash, practicing your quilting techniques, and polishing your halo. (As a Catholic, I'm hoping there's a plenary indulgence involved!) See you on second Tuesday. Dear Texas Quilt Guilds,


