Our own Nadine Darby was instrumental in getting us the invitation to present the program and she has already volunteered to make a quilt and purchase books. Board Meeting Minutes September 8, 2005

Board Members Present: Ruth Felty, Mary Mc Carthy, Dea Jae Shore, Judith Miller, Lois Beauchamp, Barbara Gilstad, Kitty Janiga, Sylvia Jolet and Teresa Tijerina.

President: The meeting was called to order at 5:10. The August Board Meeting Minutes were approved as published. Lucille Sheehan was nominated to receive a Calico Rose for her work with Folklife Festival and ITC.

An annual audit of the Guild's insurance policy has been completed and is ready for mailing.

An announcement will be made Saturday asking for volunteers to form a committee to assist Lois in the research of the current storage facilities leased by the Guild.

A report has been received from the Nominating Committee and the only open position is for the 1st Vice President.

Tonights meeting was held in an adjoining classroom to the meeting room at the St. Andrew Presbyterian Church. A motion was made to investigate using this room for all future board meetings, and the motion carried.

President Pro-Tem: Lois will proceed with the planned sale of donated items at the Saturday business meeting.

Secretary: Sixteen calls were received on the Guild's phone line this month, one call was for a generous amount of fabric samples from Star Furniture/Rug Gallery.

Treasurer: Operating Fund \$30,899.94, Reserve Balance \$26,453.31, CD \$20,000.00 and ending Total \$77,353.25.

Special Events: Gallery Cards have been made for the judged exhibit. Opening night will be on Thursday September 15 at 6pm with a buffet. All participants can bring one guest.

To date, only two seats remain available for the bus trip to Houston.

The deposit fee paid for the retreat which is later designated as "non-refundable" was discussed. Sylvia made a motion to ask the Winter/Summer Retreat Chairs, from the last two years, to develop and recommend a Cancellation Policy for the board to review, the motion was seconded, and the motion carried.

Newsletter: The newsletter is expected to be delivered this coming week.

Programs: All arrangements for this months program are complete, in October the UFO Auction will be followed by New Member Orientation, the November Program is a work-in-progress, as the December Program will be our Christmas luncheon.

<u>Services:</u> A floor plan of the new meeting room was presented and signs made for tables by Barbara were viewed. A kitchen will be available for use and a Coffee Committee will be formed.

Community Outreach: In August, Ruth and Barbara presented our Guild's Storybook and Quilts To Go project to Country Patches, Nadine Darby's quilt guild in Longview. In September, Barbara and three teachers from St. Mary's Hall presented the Storybook Quilts project at the 12th Annual Roundup for Librarians at Region 20 Education Service Center in San Antonio.

<u>Unfinished Business:</u> Ruth displayed a Blue and White Basket Quilt; the blocks were made by Ethel Howey, the quilting was completed by quilters at the Institute of Texas Cultures, and Ruth completed the setting and binding. Lois motioned to make this a permanent quilt in the Guild's collection, Barbara seconded the motion, and the motion carried.

New Business: It was decided to form an ad hac committee to make plans for future aide to Katrina evacuees. Sylvia will chair the committee and volunteers will be requested on Saturday. Any suggestions should be submitted to Sylvia in writing.

Members will be asked to take fabric samples to make tote bags and return them to the next meeting.

The meeting adjourned at 6:40pm.

General Meeting Minutes September 10, 2005

President: The meeting was called to order at 10:00. All members and visitors were welcomed to the new site for GSAQG meetings. The August minutes were approved as published. The Calico Rose this month goes to Lucille Shean for her work at Folklife Festival and organizing ITC quilters. Notification was received from Shurguard Storage that monthly fees will increase again. Volunteers were solicited to research the local area and provide a report with an acceptable location and fees. Mary Ruth Flores, Bernie Farris and Helen Johnson volunteered for this project.

The blue and white quilt on display has basket blocks made by Ethel Howey, Ruth did the setting and binding, ITC quilters quilted it and it is now a permanent quilt in our collection. Barbara Gilstad will make a label for "Ethel's Blue Baskets" and De Leclair will have it on display at the quilt show.

Members were reminded to visit the classroom with Silent Auction items. Monies from this sale will be directed to the Ethel Howey Fund.

<u>Treasurer</u>: July Report - Operating Fund \$14,858.45, Reserve \$26,535.84, CD \$20,000.00 and Total \$61.394.29.

Special Events: The Houston bus trip is full but Barbara Wofford has a reserve list for those interested. De Leclair reports she has 246 quilts for the quilt show, and reminded everyone to have sleeves on their quilts. Janet Miller asked for "hanging teams" of 4 and Jean Powell asked for "white glove" volunteers.

<u>Newsletter</u>: Reminder-please submit all information for the newsletter by midnight Monday (this is the Monday following the General Meeting every month).

<u>Programs</u>: Dye specialist Marit Lee Kucera is here today. The Auction and UFO sale is scheduled in October when New Member Orientation will follow the meeting, and the November program is being planned. Plastic or wood Coats and Clark spools are still being accepted for the December program.

<u>Services</u>: Volunteers were solicited to assist in moving tables and chairs after the meeting. It is important that we leave the room as we found it.

Community Outreach: Members were invited to visit Fall at the Alamo on October 8, where Mary Ruth Flores, and her committee of 7-8 members will enact life in the 1800's and the roles women played. Jean Powell read a letter of thanks and gratitude from Youth Alternatives. In addition, she conveyed a request from YA for a silent auction item to be sold at their 29th Anniversary "Camino de Amor Gala" on September 22 at the Westin Riverwalk.

<u>Unfinished Business</u>: An ad hoc committee will be formed to investigate how to best serve Katrina evacuees. Sylvia Jolet will be the chair of this committee, and Judith Miller will be the co-chair. Members were asked to leave their suggestions at the Bulletin Board table, and to take fabric samples to make tote bags that are reportedly needed by evacuees.

There were 102 members and nine guests present. Name tag fines collected - \$4.60.

The meeting adjourned at 10:38 am.





Fall at the Alamo is an annual one-day reenactment of village life in Texas around 1835. On the second Saturday in October, dressed in authentic period costumes, participants demonstrate crafts, occupations, and skills appropriate to the early nineteenth century. Beginning, officially, with the boom of an Army cannon at nine a.m., this free, day long event attracts thousands of attendees, many of them visitors to our city.

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild has participated in Fall at the Alamo for eight years. Mary Ruth Flores and her committee have a reserved place in the ballroom - a prime location for catching cool breezes on a hot day and an enviable dry spot on a rainy day. Carrying suitable sewing supplies (no plastic!) in hand baskets and wearing dresses made from patterns and



1850s bed in Mary Ruth's possession. The guild members have an enjoyable time answering questions about quilting and quilts, and pretending to be ladies of the period. There is always plenty of food and drink and great camaraderie with the other re-enactors. The stories shared by the public and the interest displayed in what they are doing make the quilters feel their participation is truly worthwhile.


