GSAQG Board Meeting Minutes 03/02/2015

Ida Blankenship called the meeting to order at 3:00 pm. Members in attendance were Karen Lambdin, Ida Blankenship, Judith Miller, Jeana Kubik, Linda Ethridge, Dea Jae Shore, Cindy Shutt, and Carol Bryant. Janet Miller was also present to give a special report.

Ida asked if there were any nominations for the Calico Rose award and it was decided not to award one this month.

Janet Miller discussed her report on the Beaucamp Collection. She recommended that the guild maintain the collection with the caveat that the guild makes the collection official with policies and guidelines for future acquisitions. Janet will return with recommendations for future action. It was also decided to have a special display of the collection at the quilt show in September if possible.

Ida suggested a list of founders and past presidents be provided in a history section with the Directory. This will not be in the current directory as it is already in print.

Bonnie McCoy's granddaughter would like to start a memorial scholarship in Bonnie's honor. Ida will get more information for future discussion.

The need to shorten guild meetings was the next discussion. This is especially important when there is a speaker with a trunk show and/or workshop. Some suggestions were to limit members to one bring-and-brag item on these days. Another suggestion was to shorten announcements by requiring members to write out the announcement and having one member read them. Judith Miller volunteered to be the reader. Also, it was suggested to shorten the break by 5 minutes.

Treasurer – Cindy Shutt gave the balance as of Feb. 28th at \$72,639.84. The January financial were checked and approved. Also, she gave the records to the CPA for tax reporting.

!st VP Special Events – Carol Bryant. It was decided that the mini retreat chairpersons will report to Carol Bryant in future as do the major retreat chairpersons. The mini retreat chairpersons will also be in charge of getting equipment to the retreat location.

2nd **VP for Information** – Dea Jae Shore informed the board that the directories are at the printers, and she will be handing them out at the meeting in March. Any leftovers will be mailed. Dea Jae also wants to meet with quilt show committee members after the meeting to hand out flash drives.

3rd **VP for Programs** – Rebecca Cook was not in attendance, but she sent a report that two replacement irons were purchased.

4th **VP for Services** – Jeana Jubik asked for a stand and table for the Kerrville raffle quilt which will be on display at the March meeting.

5th **VP for Community Outreach** – Sherry Duringer told the board that Jeana Kubik is quilting a quilt that is to be donated to KLRN. KLRN will auction the quilt in June and the guild will get lots of advertising in return.

Kitty Janiga and Mary McCarthy are mentoring students at a retirement home. Carol Steely will be helping at an art walk at an elementary school. Other requests are events at another school and a library program.

Other business – a request for a board meeting time change was declined.

Board members are asked to get to the guild meetings as early as possible.

GSAQG Guild Meeting Minutes

March 14, 2015

Ida began the meeting at 10:03 am with a welcome to visitors and to members of the Hill Country Quilt Guild with their raffle quilt.

Corrections to the minutes from last month's meeting were suggested: Cathy Baisley won the Kris Thompson scholarship, not the Ethel Howey Grant, and Jeana Kubik is the 4th VP for Services, not programs. The minutes were approved as corrected.

The Calico Rose was presented to Barbara Sumlin for chairing the Winter Retreat; she wasn't here last month to receive it. Barbara recognized the other members of her committee also.

Ida explained that in order expedite the meeting, she is asking that members bring a condensed version of their quilting-related announcements to Karen Lambdin, who will read them to members. Also those with Bring and Brag were asked to keep it succinct.

Treasurer Cindy Shutt reported a balance of \$72,639.84 as of February.

Special Events

Quilt show chair Bernie Ferris reminded members to get those quilt show entries in as none have been submitted so far. She also needs members to sell raffle tickets.

Donnis Todd said there were 2 spaces left for the Summer Retreat. A \$50 deposit is required. Applications for the Sherry Allred Grant are now being accepted. This grant will pay for one member's Summer Retreat fees. Donnis also reminded those who are signed up for retreat to come over and sign their waivers.

Block kits are ready for the retreat quilt project that will be donated to the auction.

Information - Dea Jae Shore asked members to pick up directories today. They will be mailed out after today.

Programs - Rebecca Cook announced the speaker for today is Jen Eskridge, who will be discussing how to publish in the quilting world. Jen also has books and patterns for sale.

Next month the speaker will be De LeClair, and Rebecca will be starting registration for Charlotte Angotti's workshop in June.. Quilt Project Committee News

(commonly called QPC)

(This committee provides members an opportunity to try new techniques or just practice what they know.)

The committee is working hard to offer kits that are fun but possibly challenging for you. Projects currently available are: Disappearing 4-Patch and Disappearing Pinwheel (both start with common blocks which are then cut and pieces moved around to make new designs); Paths to Piece (pieced strips); 6-Point Star (set in seams, may be hand or machine pieced); French Ivy (pieced, some paper piecing, hand applique), Whirligigs (donated pieced triangles to set together to form a octagon); and Zignosis (this is in the "humor me" category, a 2 part project, starting with pieced strips forming a rectangle which is cut into 2 triangles. When we get all the triangles, it will be laid out in rows and sent out as Part 2). On our list of projects to come are flannel apple core (yes, curves, but they are very large pieces); more strip piecing with machine applique; strips with diamonds on the ends forming a star when blocks are sewn together; and some blocks with lots of pieces (but not difficult sewing), and if we get those ready, I have more on my bucket list to try. Think about stepping outside your comfort zone.

Pieces of the Past:



Irish Chain by Ellen Hernandez



It took 75 years for John Hines to receive this hand pieced red and gray Irish Chain quilt top from his grandmother. Barbara Storms from KY recently bought the top on eBay for \$50. She planned to hand quilt it until she found an attached note: "To John Keith Hines from Laura A. Hunt finished Aug. 19, 1940." Using findagrave.com and ancestry.com Barbara easily discovered that Laura Hunt was from Indiana and had a grandson named John Hines. Using whitepages.com she found 87 year old John residing in an IN assisted living center. A phone call confirmed that John was interested in the quilt. Barbara drove 300 miles to deliver the top to John - at no charge. He said his grandmother was 76 when she made the quilt and he

was only 12. He never received the quilt and assumed it was auctioned off with his grandmother's belongings after her death in 1947.

Is the Irish quilt from Ireland? No one knows where the name came from exactly. Three theories exist. One, the quilt is similar to Irish weaving patterns. Next, Irish migration to America was considered a continuing chain. One family member in the US sponsored the entry of an Irish

relative. With a limit on sponsorship, the newest immigrant would sponsor another family member, and so on like adding links in a chain. The third possibility is a reference to a common surveying tool for linear measure, called an Irish Chain or a Gunter with 100 links equaling 66 feet.



An Irish Chain quilt starts out as a linked Nine Patch with alternating solid blocks. The color variations and number of squares determines the Single, Double, or Triple pattern. The open spaced blocks allow for lovely quilting patterns, commonly feather circles.
















One of the oldest known Irish Chain quilts is this one from 1786. The pattern was quite popular in the early 1800s.

This 1805 indigo and white quilt was made by Margaret Kee who came from Ireland to settle in West Virginia in 1807. By placing the nine block squares on point, the pattern looks like squares instead of diamonds.

GREATER SAN ANTONIO QUILT GUILD, INC. ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild (GSAQG) has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials and books. The grant(s) will be awarded annually, not to exceed \$1000. The Grant Committee may divide the monies between more than one recipient. The GSAQG is not obligated to award the entire \$1,000 or any part thereof, if the quality of the proposals does not merit it.

ELIGIBILITY

- Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous **two (2) years** immediately preceding the grant deadline.
- An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history or technique.
- Financial need will NOT be a criteria for selection.
- Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for three years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

- Applications must be submitted on or before August 1 (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January Guild meeting.
- If the recipient fails to fulfill the requirements or is unable to attend the proposed project or program, the grant money must be returned within **three (3) months** of the cancellation, or on a time-line agreed to by the committee and the applicant. If an alternate applicant is available, the money may be transferred to the alternate with approval of the committee.
- Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained.
 This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop or other process that disseminates the information to the members in the year following receipt of the grant. Scheduling must be coordinated with the 1st Vice President for Programs.
- If a workshop or program is being presented, at a minimum of (3) three months before the scheduled Guild workshop or program, a lesson plan and class sample will be presented to the Ethel Howey Chairperson, the 1st Vice President for Programs and one Guild member-at-large.
- Recipient must submit, in writing, a final report of the project and expenses by March 1 of the year following receipt of the grant.

GSAQG ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION PROCESS

Following the stated time line, submit a typed or hand written application, not to exceed two (2) pages. Include the date, your name, address, phone numbers, email, number of years a GSAQG

- 3. How you will share your new skills, techniques and information with the membership.

I also added two books thanks to generous members who came up to the table during the meeting with donations:


