The Ethel Howey Grant was created by the Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild in 2006 to honor founding Guild member, Ethel Howey. The Grant is a monetary award that allows a Guild member to further their quilting skills and share these quilting skills with the Guild.

The deadline for the Ethel Howey Grant is August 1 and is open to any Guild members meeting the guidelines.

If you are applying for the Grant take the time to talk with Guild members, VP for Programs and previous winners to learn what skills/techniques are needed or wanted. Review national teachers the Guild has had in the past year so you don't repeat their teaching.

Please consider applying and giving back to the Guild.

Common Threads GREATER SAN ANTONIO QUILT GUILD, INC. ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild (GSAQG) has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials and books. The grant(s) will be awarded annually, not to exceed \$1000. The Grant Committee may divide the monies between more than one recipient. The GSAQG is not obligated to award the entire \$1,000 or any part thereof, if the quality of the proposals does not merit it. **ELIGIBILITY**

• Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous **two (2) years** immediately preceding the grant deadline.

• An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history or technique.

• Financial need will NOT be a criteria for selection.

• Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for three years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

• Applications must be submitted **on or before August 1** (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January Guild meeting.

• If the recipient fails to fulfill the requirements or is unable to attend the proposed project or program, the grant money must be returned within **three (3) months** of the cancellation, or on a time-line agreed to by the committee and the applicant. If an alternate applicant is available, the money may be transferred to the alternate with approval of the committee.

• Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained. This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop or other process that disseminates the information to the members in **the year following receipt of the grant**. Scheduling must be coordinated with the 1st Vice President for Programs.

• If a workshop or program is being presented, **at a minimum of (3) three months before** the scheduled Guild workshop or program, a lesson plan and class sample will be presented to the Ethel Howey Chairperson, the 1st Vice President for Programs and one Guild member-at-large.

• Recipient must submit, in writing, a final report of the project and expenses **by March 1** of the year following receipt of the grant.

GSAQG ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION PROCESS

Following the stated time line, submit a typed or hand written application, not to exceed two (2) pages. Include the date, your name, address, phone numbers, email, number of years a GSAQG member, and explain:

- 1. Why you would like to receive this grant
- 2. How you will use the grant funds, including a specific budget

3. How you will share your new skills, techniques and information with the membership.

Feel free to provide any additional information that will help the selection committee.

5.16 Pieces of the Past, 73: 'Worst Quilt' Contest, by Ellen Hernandez



The *Worst Quilt in the World Contest* was held annually from 1995 to 1997. Ami Simms was promoting her book, *How* Not *to Make a Prize-Winning Quilt*. As she wrote it occurred to her that other quilters might have examples of things that can go wrong with a quilt project. Calling on the assistance of well-known manufacturers such as Omnigrid, Gingher, and Bernina, Ami was able to assemble over \$5000 in cash and prizes for her unique contest. The first year over 700 entries were submitted. Points were awarded for bad design, awful color combinations and sloppy workmanship. There were extra points for quilts with pet hair or stains.


Some quilts were immediately placed in the *Too Good to Win* category. It was an honor NOT to win this contest! Those quilters received a lapel pin stating *"Thank Goodness I Didn't Win the Worst Quilt in the World Contest."*



The 1995 winner from Georgia entered *Cracked China*. The color choices were described as wild and the poorly sewn quilt had no batting in the sashing. No matter what, the quilt would not lay flat!

The 1996 Grand Prize winner was *Penrose Folly*, a puckered ugly green polyester quilt. When the quilter ran out of green fabric, she used navy blue for this challenging tessellation pattern.

Over the years the judges played along with tongue-incheek categories for *Abominable Mention Awards* and Special Recognition Awards such as: *Knot on Your Life*



for hand stitching without any knots, *Seamed Like a Good Idea at the Time* for using the wrong side of the fabric with seams facing outward, *Now We've Seen Everything* for binding with duct tape, *Pathetic Piecing, Mangled Miter, Inept Applique, Most Obnoxious Use of Three Dimensional Embellishment, Most Distorted Block, Yes You Can Make Stunning Quilts from Simple Patterns but Didn't, Close but no Cigar, Most Disgusting Name for a Quilt, Most Bizarre Use of Bias Binding, Fur Ball, Most Peculiar,* etc.



Not all winners were novice quilters. John Flynn, now known for his quilting frame and prize winning quilts, won *Most Disgusting Name* for *Kitty in the Blender*, a swirling Christmas runner using cat fabric.

This compass quilt entry didn't look too bad UNTIL you viewed it from a different angle.

Ami's comments on the contest are no matter how bad your work, it could be worse, and at least you can laugh.

In 2014 Ami revisited her contest by gathering former *Worst Quilt* entries for a special exhibit at AQS QuiltWeek in Lancaster, PA.



(Ami is also known as the creator in 2006 of the Alzheimer's Art Quilt Initiative. More than \$1.1 million was raised for research by 2013.)

Issue 5 Commor Reports for Community Outreach – 1st Quarter 2016

The first quarter of 2016 has already come to an end, and your outreach committees have been very busy in San Antonio. Bright Hopes delivered 89 quilts and 159 tote bags to the Children's Shelter. Storybooks and Quilts to Go distributed totes to 21 schools this semester and received 6 new guilts for the collection. The ITC Quilters finished two member quilts and have begun interacting with numerous school groups as spring field trips are getting into full swing. Quilters Save Our Stories conducted interviews with three members to record for The Quilt Alliance. Community Education continues to lead a quilt class at Golden Manor and attended a Mini Maker Faire at the Main Public Library. Community Quilt Angels met with a representative of GenCare to plan their goals for the year, and constructed a top to be guilted for a fund raiser for Fisher House. All told, the committees reported a combined 1,860 hours of volunteer service this quarter!

Any of them would be thrilled to add you to their group. Don't forget the workday at our May meeting – most of these groups will be working on projects. And we are looking forward to hearing about the work of The Children's Shelter and how our Bright Hopes quilts contribute to their mission.


