

4.18 Pieces of the Past, 96: Feedsacks, Part 1 by Ellen Hernandez

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Feed, flour, sugar, seeds, rice, and fertilizer were sold in wooden boxes, barrels, and tins in the early 19th Century. The invention of the sewing machine and a commercial lock stitch machine in 1860 led to the transition of using feed sacks for supplies, first made with burlap. They were called chicken linen, hen house linen, and pretties. The lock stitch, made with a one thread chain stitch, released or unraveled easily making emptying the bag convenient. One seamstress could sew 200 half-barrel sized bags a day. As cotton became abundant and cheap, it replaced burlap. A typical chicken farmer might use 14 sacks of feed per week.

The George Plant Milling company of St. Louis, MO produced red gingham sacks in 1925 coined 'Gingham Girl Flour.' They were so popular, a series in other colors were dubbed 'Gingham Mother..Baby...Queen.' There were over 30 sack mills, including the large companies Chase, Bemis, Fulton, and Percy Kent. Percy Kent is credited with making dress



prints for bags in the 1930s. *Kent's Cloth* was made to recognize the newly forming UN with wartime symbols and three bad eggs - Hitler, Mussolini, and Tojo in a

frying pan 'Keep 'em frying!' Kent also hired European artists and had a Disney contract. Richard Peek of the Kent Company introduced the pastel palette of solids linked to the Depression Era – pink, lavender, orchid, tea rose, peach, yellow, rose, blue, tan, green. Most sacks included a printed logo or label from the company. There were many tips and tricks to removing this ink prior to repurposing the sack: lard, lye soap, kerosene,

or Fels Naptha soap. Some brand names were printed in removable, water-soluble vegetable ink. In the 1920s paper labels appeared which could be soaked off. Ideas for using the sacks included aprons, dresses, children's clothing, dishtowels, and curtains. A monthly newsletter, 'Out of the Bag', was published in the 1920s which included tips from The Household Science Institute for feedsacks.

During WWI, the future president, Herbert Hoover, founded the Commission for Relief in Belgium (CRB). The primary item sent to Belgium was flour in cotton sacks, almost 1 billion pounds. Fearing confiscation and use by the Germans in the production of ammunition, the CRB controlled the distribution and location of the sacks. Many were recycled by the Belgians who often over embroidered

the printed mill stamps. They sent some of the decorated sacks back to the US as a thank you, and some were sold to raise funds for war relief.



Probably 20,000 designs were used for feedsacks including cloth toy patterns printed with non-poisonous ink – *Rag Darlings, Sailor Boy*, and *Sea Island Sugar Dolls*. There were puppets, animals for pillows, Christmas stockings, and cheater cloth for those not wanting to piece their quilts....to be continued in Part 2.







SEARCHING FOR A NEW VENUE

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild was formed in 1980 as a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization that promotes the skill of quilting by doing community service, quilt shows, and other functions relating to keeping the art of quilting alive. Our current membership is over 200. We meet on the 2nd Saturday of every month from about 9 am - 4 pm. Our current location is at a Presbyterian church whose bylaws have changed on the 1st of the year which conflicts with services we provide to our members, as well as an increase in our monthly rental fee.

During our business meeting on any given Saturday, we have several committees that offer things for sale to our members, such as used books, magazines, and the sale of raffle tickets for our fundraising events as well as inviting other area guilds to sell tickets for theirs. We also have national teachers come to a few meetings a year and conduct presentations as well as hold classes after our meeting, and sometimes on the Friday before. A condition of having these popular and knowledgeable teachers is their requirement to sell their books, patterns, and supplies during a class. The place we meet now has told us we cannot have any sales or money exchange hands in the meeting hall anymore.

Our current meeting space is about 4000 square feet. We can have up to 150 members attend a meeting, but the usual average is about 120. We have several committees that set up around the meeting space to offer outreach and services to the members so they need about 15 tables.

Would your facility be able to accommodate us? What would the rate be? Can we arrange for Dea Jea Shore or another Venue Committee member meet with you?
