- Institute of Texan Cultures (ITC) quilters would like to have GSAQG business cards to hand out. Ina Ramirez will propose some designs for board review.
- The June board meeting will be at Igo Library.

President Pro-Tem – DeaJae Shore - Fabric at the guild storage will be reviewed and culled.

Treasurer – Karen Nanos - Total Guild funds on hand was \$60,184.75. Storage rent at Lockaway Storage increased from \$281 to \$298 for the guild 10x20 storage unit. Alternatives are to be evaluated. Tax return has been prepared and will be filed shortly. Deposit has been received from St. Andrews.

Secretary – Lyn Komada - Lyn will not be present at the June Board and General Membership meetings. Sylvia Jolet volunteered to take minutes at the Board Meeting and General Membership meetings.

1st VP for Special Events – Elaine Staller - Mary reported for Elaine that Auction has a flyer, which will be handed out at the meeting on how members can help. Bookmarks, postcards, and tickets are ready. Trixie Shell has agreed to lead the Fall Mini-Retreat.

2nd VP for Information – Ina Ramirez - Nothing to report.

3rd VP for Programs – Janet Miller - Upcoming activities were discussed, including plans for the guild birthday this month.

4th VP for Services – Leti Zavala - Nothing to report.

5th VP for Community Outreach – Barbara Sumlin - Committees reported that all committee reports were received and the quarterly report for the first quarter was produced. Some highlights:

- ITC quilters worked on 3 quilts. The tricentennial quilt for the ITC has been completed and will be hung behind the quilters on the exhibit floor.
- From an alliance meeting: The Geometry Lab is looking for people to help with a “Math Tour” on Family Sundays. This exhibit uses a quilt example to discuss shapes. They would like to take this tour to schools also.
- Community Quilt Angels delivered 9 quilts to Audie Murphy Community Center, and are working on quilts for guild veterans.
- Bright Hopes completed 103 quilts and 189 totes.
- Storybooks to Go have 17 schools in the program and have 3 new quilts.
- Community Education participated in the Library Faire and a program for home schooled children.

Ways to advertise (neighborhood newsletter, letting friends and coworkers know, etc.) were discussed. Tickets are \$5 and will be \$7 at the door.
- Quilt Project Finishing Committee (QPFC) Chair, Ida Blankenship, showed quilts needing quilting. Discussed workday projects as well.

2nd VP for Information – Ina Ramirez. The newsletter welcomes Quilt-related articles.

3rd VP for Programs – Janet Miller. Discussed upcoming activities.

4th VP for Services – Leti Zavala. Committees reported:

- Please return all Cat blocks, they are needed for the cat quilt.
- Melody Martin won the Golden Carrot award.

5th VP for Community Outreach – Barbara Sumlin. Committees reported:

- Cathy Wallace, Institute of Texan Cultures (ITC) Quilters Chair - discussed volunteering at Folklife festival, June 8-10.
- Linda Kirk, Storybook Quilts Chair - Storybook quilts need to be retrieved the week of May 21-25, and the committee will meet on 31 May at 1pm at the storage facility to add them back into the collection. Discussed workday activities.
- Kitty Janiga, Community Education Chair - Volunteers are needed on May 26 at the Leon Valley Pioneer Ice Cream Social at the Huebner-Onion Homestead. At this event in honor of the San Antonio Tricentennial, we need quilters willing to do quilting handwork: hand applique, hand quilting, or embroidered blocks. 6.18 Pieces of the Past, 98: Indigo by Ellen Hernandez

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Many plants have been used for blue dyes for centuries, primarily the cold climate yellow flowering woad, and three tropical indigofera plants Anil, Natal, and true indigo. Indigo dye can be traced back to at least 3000 BC, both in India, and Egypt where it was used in burial cloths. The early Greeks named the product, thought to be a mineral, 'indikon' meaning it came from India. Marco Polo and Vasco da Gama were responsible for making Indian and Asian indigo available and popular in Europe. Prior to this import, woad leaves were used for blue dye but they produced a weaker color requiring more plant product. The true indigo was more widely available and required less product to produce more dye. The dye was used on wool, silk, and linen, to make paint, and for tattoos. Blocks of compressed indigo were even used as currency.



Indigo production was a lengthy, laborious, foul smelling process. Fresh stems and leaves picked at a precise time were covered with water in vats and pounded, then left to ferment. Eventually the dye separated from the water and after straining a blue paste remained. When completely dry, it was cut into blocks and packaged for shipping. Much of the strenuous work in the US was done by slaves. Curiously, urine was used to prepare the dye before ammonia distillation was available. The British imported indigo for their military uniforms. Years later, about the time of Levi Strauss' blue denim jeans, the demand for indigo increased and scientists searched for a synthetic substitute. German chemist, Adolf von Baeyer, was able to develop a synthetic indigo in the late 1800s, for which he won the Nobel prize in 1905.

The first successful cultivation of indigo in the US can be attributed to Eliza Lucas, born in 1722 in Antigua, British West Indies. She was sent to study in London at a finishing school where she developed an interest in botany. Her family moved to South Carolina in 1738 after inheriting thousands of acres in three plantations.



Eliza at 16 became manager and supervisor of the businesses of tar, timber, and rice when her father, Governor Lucas, had to return to the West Indies. In a search to find more cash crops, Eliza experimented with ginger, cotton, alfalfa, and indigo seeds sent by her father from Antigua. After several years of crop failures, by 1744 Eliza had proven indigo a success and shared her knowledge with other planters. Within two years indigo exports to Britain increased from 5,000 pounds to 130,000. Over the next thirty years exports increased to 1 million pounds per year. Exports to Britain ended with the Revolutionary War in 1775, after which India became the primary producer of indigo.



Eliza chose her husband, Judge Charles Pinckney. She educated their four children. Charles died fourteen years after their marriage which left Eliza to run the businesses alone again, including silk production. During the Revolutionary War, the British destroyed the family plantations. Son Charles Jr. signed the Constitution, introduced long-staple Sea Island cotton, served three terms as SC governor, and ran for President twice. Son Thomas was a prisoner of war, also served as governor of SC, ran for Vice President, and was a US Representative. At Eliza's funeral in 1793, botany enthusiast George Washington was a pallbearer.

In 1850 *The Journal and Letters of Eliza Lucas* was published. Eliza was the first woman to be inducted into the South Carolina Business Hall of Fame in 1989.
