QUILT SHOW 2019

It is just a few months away for our 2019 show! I am accepting items to be sold in the boutique at every meeting up to the show. For newer members, the Guild has a boutique at the show where your items can be sold. Items must be sewing or quilting related. The guild will collect a 20% commission off the sales price. The sales price placed on the item must include this 20% as well as about 8% for retail sales tax. Keep your prices in increments of .25¢ so I do not have to have so much change on hand. One-dollar increments are even better!!!

I will be setting up the boutique the Wednesday and Thursday before the show and can accept items at the event center. I can also accept your items during the show, as time allows, but whichever way you get your items to me, an inventory sheet must be filled out and every item must be on the sheet. Every item must be tagged with the price and your unique inventory code.

I have inventory sheets you can fill out, or you can turn in your own. If you do your own, it must include your contact info (name, address, email, phone number), a unique inventory control number, and the item number, description and price of each item. By submitting either form, you are agreeing to work one 2-hour session in the boutique and myself, the guild, or the event center cannot be held liable for any loss or damage to your items. Your items must be self-insured. Your unique inventory code can be your initials, a series of 3-4 numbers or a combination of both. That is how we will identify you when an item is sold to be sure you are paid! Doing your own spreadsheet and creating your tags with mail merge is the way to go!!!

I will accept one or one hundred items; completed or assembled in a bag as a kit, bundles of fabric as a theme or a grouping. You can even put in fat quarters, but remember; every item you want in the boutique must be on an inventory sheet and must be tagged. I will have inventory forms at any meeting or email me to send you an excel spreadsheet. The tags can be of any form or fashion. Each tag must have your unique inventory code, name of the item, item number and the sales price. If you have room on the tag, put your name on it, just as an extra way to give you credit! Remember, the sales price will have about 28% taken out.

Books or magazines will not be accepted. We cannot take any items that are not tagged. It is the only way we can control the inventory and give you credit when something is sold. You are responsible for picking up any unsold items at the end of the show.



7.19 Pieces of the Past, 111: **Dresden Plate** by Ellen Hernandez

Dresden, Germany produced beautifully designed porcelain plates with flowers, foliage, scrolls, and fruit from the mid-1800s to the mid-1900s. The factory was actually in Meissen, founded in 1710 using the secret Chinese and Japanese hard paste porcelain process. The painting shops and designers were in Dresden. Because there were over 200 painting shops, there was no standard Dresden trademark, though a blue crown was first registered. Karl Richard Klemm's designs





oyster plates. The other three original companies were Donath, Oswald Lorenz, and Adolf Hamman. Besides china, lace figurines known as Dresden Lace continue to be collectibles. Real lace was dipped in liquid porcelain and applied to molded figures by hand. During firing, the lace burned away leaving the fragile lace design.

World War II had a great impact on Dresden porcelain. The city of Dresden was heavily bombed during WWII and most of the studios, documents, and painting businesses were destroyed. German porcelain artist Anton Muller and his son, Herman, and grandson Erich died during WWII and their family factory was destroyed. Anton's niece rebuilt the factory in 1945 but fled East Germany in 1962 taking porcelain molds with her. The new factory was built in Ireland where *Irish Dresden* originated. The company closed in 2009 but reopened in 2015. Some Dresden designs were copied and produced in "Occupied Japan" from 1945 - 1952.



A quilt block given the name *Dresden Plate* was also called *Grandmother's Sunburst, Friendship Ring, Aster, Dahlia,* and *Sunflower.* In the US, the pattern was especially popular during the Depression era using the many prints of feedsacks. The edges of the wedge-shaped pieces were curved, straight, pointed, or a combination. Some historians

suggest fan quilt block designs from the late 1800s were the precursor to the

Dresden, with four "fans" joined into one block.









The earliest known Dresden style block

was used in Anna Tuels' inscribed and dated 1785 quilt made by her mother. This quilt, in the permanent collection of the Wadsworth Antheneum Museum in CT, holds several special features. At the time, laws prevented married women from owning property, yet Anna's maiden name on the quilt identified it as her own. Some of the fabrics used in the quilt were known to be imported from England, so from a wealthy family. There is duroy, tapizadoe, calamanco, fleuret, as well as corduroys, silk, linen, and damask. The blocks were made in the English paper-piecing style. The encased papers contributed to the conservation of the quilt,

providing more stability for the vintage fabrics.

Dresden plate quilts continue to be popular today and there are many pattern shortcuts and design options available.

Opening on June 13, the retrospective with 15 quilts of this artist's unique work is sure to delight the eye with its colorful and detailed images that bring to mind the wonders of the optical instrument.

Nadelstern will also make an appearance at the Museum and give a free lecture about her work and the exhibit on Saturday, June 29, at 3 pm. Museum admission is free beginning at 2 pm.

"As Paula has said, the word 'kaleidoscope promises surprise and magic, change and chance. Paula Nadelstern's amazing quilts sparkle with these elements," says Museum



Curator Dr. Sandra Sider. "Most of these works are quilted by hand, and several of them feature fabrics designed by the maker whose work was included in The Twentieth Century's 100 Best American Quilts. Come and enjoy the fascinating world of Paula's beautiful quilts!"



On her website, Nadelstern expounds on her work. "Exploding with visual excitement, a kaleidoscopic design organizes an abundance of light and color. form and motion into a complex and coherent image," she writes.

"My goal is to harmoniously integrate the idea of a kaleidoscope with the techniques and materials of quiltmaking. I try to free myself from a conventional sense of fabric orderliness, seeking a random quality in order to imitate the succession of chance interlinkings and endless possibilities synonymous with kaleidoscopes."

Also on display this summer is an exhibit that features contemporary interpretations of some of quilting's most traditional patterns, blocks, styles, and techniques. Opening on June 27, "In the American Tradition" features 31 works of breadth and diversity

"Our exhibition includes works in traditional style, some with an original twist, such as a charming hankie appliqué quilted with hearts, an autumnthemed guilt with pumpkins on the bordering vine. a basket design with different flowers in each basket, and a Double Wedding Ring in brilliant neon hues," Dr. Sider says.

Several showstoppers feature spectacular hand quilting, the technique dominating this exhibition. It also has an appealing pictorial quilt depicting four 18th-century women stitching the original American flag, along with a graphically modern Yo-Yo quilt.

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild (GSAQG) has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials and books. The grant(s) will be awarded annually, not to exceed \$1,000. The Grant Committee may divide the monies between more than one recipient. The GSAQG is not obligated to award the entire \$1,000 or any part thereof, if the quality of the proposals does not merit it.

ELIGIBILITY

- Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous **two (2) years** immediately preceding the grant deadline.
- An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history or technique.
- Financial need will NOT be a criteria for selection.
- Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for three years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

- Applications must be submitted **on or before August 1** (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January Guild meeting.
- If the recipient fails to fulfill the requirements or is unable to attend the proposed project or program, the grant money must be returned within **three (3) months** of the cancellation, or on a time-line agreed to by the committee and the applicant. If an alternate applicant is available, the money may be transferred to the alternate with approval of the committee.
- Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained. This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop or other process that disseminates the information to the members in the year following receipt of the grant. Scheduling must be coordinated with the 1st Vice President for Programs.
- If a workshop or program is being presented, at a minimum of (3) three months before the scheduled Guild workshop or program, a lesson plan and class sample will be presented to the Ethel Howey Chairperson, the 1st Vice President for Programs and one Guild member-at-large.
- Recipient must submit, in writing, a final report of the project and expenses by March 1 of the year following receipt
 of the grant.

GSAQG ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION PROCESS

Following the stated time line, submit a typed or hand written application, not to exceed two (2) pages. Include the date, your name, address, phone numbers, email, number of years a GSAQG member, and explain:

- 1. Why you would like to receive this grant
- 2. How you will use the grant funds, including a specific budget
- 3. How you will share your new skills, techniques and information with the membership.

Feel free to provide any additional information that will help the selection committee.
