President – Mary McCarthy

1. May board meeting minutes stand approved as published.

President Pro Tem - Dea Jae Shore

- 1. Reported that the virtual Bring and Brag was a success. The board agreed it should continue. She has more entries for June.
- 2. Confirmed that board members had received their directories. Mailed Guild directories to all members.

#### 7.2020 Pieces of the Past, 123: Hancock's of Paducah, by Ellen Hernandez



One would not imagine that the non-descript warehouse looking buildings off Hwy 60 in Paducah, Kentucky, would be a travel mecca for thousands of people. But every spring and fall during the American Quilting Society (AQS) Quilt Shows busloads of people pour into the 60,000 square foot buildings of Hancock's of Paducah searching for quilting fabric, thread, and notions. The origins of the store were miles away.

Dorothy Rowland was from Bristol, England and was orphaned at age twelve. During WWII she met a young US Army soldier, William Hancock. They married and had two sons and lived in Batesville, Mississippi. Dorothy was a skilled seamstress and together with her husband, and later brother-in-law Lawrence D. Hancock, started The Hancock Fabric Center in 1952 to supply small towns with fabrics and notions. Lawrence branched out to create Hancock Textiles which became a national chain, Hancock Fabrics. This chain went bankrupt in 2016 and all 250 stores were closed.



After William's death, son Rowland moved their company to Paducah, KY and opened a 15,000 square foot store named Hancock's of Paducah that became successful nationwide primarily by catalog orders. The current location opened in 1986 and then doubled in size in 1996 making it the world's largest retail fabric store. The mail order and email departments have been streamlined by the current owner, Rowland's son, Justin and serves the US and over 60 countries. With online ordering they have

been able to keep the business profitable even in the time of COVID-19.







The shop has hundreds of rows of fabric, some even sorted alphabetically by color, enormous racks full of precuts, and dozens of boxes of kits. The store design is an open warehouse rather than a glamorous showroom.

Paducah is a small town, population about 25,000, on the edge of the Tennessee and Ohio Rivers founded in 1827 by Lewis & Clark. It was an important port for steam boat trade as well as a red brick factory and foundry for rail components. Since the 60-foot great flood of 1937 a 14-foot-high concrete wall was built along the riverfront with pumping stations and gates. The wall is now decorated with 50 beautiful life-sized painted murals that can be viewed on an evening walk, perhaps while enjoying a mason jar of the local Moonshine or an award-winning craft beer.



The city's claim to fame is 'Quilt City USA' since The National Quilt Museum opened there in 1991. It has three galleries and their exhibits rotate about ten times a year. The AQS started Quilt Week in 1984 and draws about 32,000 visitors, generating over \$25million. The downtown streets are walkable with fabric, craft, and guirky shops and restaurants all about. Other points of interest include Hotel Metropolitan built in 1909 for African-American travelers, now a museum; the Paducah Railroad Museum; River Discovery Center; Vice President Alben Barkley's restored 1860s Whitehaven mansion, now a welcome center; William Clark Market House Museum; and the Yeiser Art Center.


