6.2021 Pieces of the Past, 134: If Quilts Could Talk, by Ellen Hernandez

In 1992 it was a pivotal year for American quilters. That was the year that The Smithsonian Institution allowed a New York importer to reproduce twelve historical American quilts in China, resulting in cheap knock-offs and

ultimately reducing the value of true hand-crafted US quilts. In response to a public outcry, the Smithsonian did not renew their three-year import deal and instead began working with *Cabin Creek Quilts* to reproduce quilt designs. *Cabin Creek* was started in 1970 as a co-op for Volunteers In Service To America (VISTA), primarily for Appalachian women to earn income from their hand-crafted items. Reviving their movement and seeking more volunteer quilters in 1992, *Cabin Creek* reached out to the Alabama Freedom Quilting Bee and Lakota Sioux reservations in the Dakotas, Missouri Breaks, to make an All-American quilt. Its background was a traditional log cabin with an American eagle, peace pipe, and a star. *Lands' End* featured the limited-edition quilt in their catalog and it quickly sold out. They continued their collaboration with *Cabin Creek* for more quilt designs.



At the same time as this Smithsonian crisis, *Land's End* joined *Good Housekeeping* magazine to sponsor a national "*All-American Quilt Contest*." They repeated the contest in 1994 and 1996 titled "*If Quilts Could Talk*." Quilters wrote essays about their quilt entries. There was a first prize winner from every state and national first, second, and third place winners with monetary prizes of \$10,000-\$3,000-\$2,000 respectively. In the later contests there were additional winning categories of Judges' Choice and Kids Quilt. There were 13,100 quilts entered in the three contests. Entrants ranged in age from very young to those in their eighties. Some were experienced sewers or quilters and some were new to the craft and self-taught. Quilt themes included commemorative events, survival through personal struggles, and political issues. Lands' End donated their collection of essays, images and other contest materials to the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress in 1997.



The 1992 National First Place winning quilt was by Marianne Webb of Roswell, GA. She chose to honor Gulf War troops with her originally designed patriotic theme. Many people asked for her pattern, but the

contest rules declared it the property of *Lands' End*.

Winner Kathryn Rouse from Wisconsin used a combination of piecing and applique for her Russian Sunflowers in 1994. Her

first craft interests were silver jewelry making and clothing while she worked as a Montessori teacher.





Candy Goff of Montana took first place in 1996. She was a self-taught quilter and drafted her blocks from a picture. Lands' End purchased the quilt for their corporate art collection. She has continued to quilt, winning many contests in Paducah and Houston.

Former GSAQG member Alma Sherrill was a Texas finalist in the 1996 contest.


