11.2021 Pieces of the Past, 139: Marguerite McLoughlin's Sewing Cabinet, by Ellen Hernandez



Marguerite Waden was born around 1775, probably near Grand Portage on Lake Superior to a fur trader and a Native woman. After many hard years travelling with her families to various outposts and settlements across the north, she grew to be a respected, well-to-do member of the Vancouver, WA and Oregon City, OR communities. She was a skilled seamstress and beader and a mentor to young women.

Marguerite's father had come to Canada from Switzerland at the age of 17 as a soldier during the French and Indian War. He settled in Montreal with a wife, Marie LaRose, and

had six children. Leaving this family, he became a transient fur trader and lived with an Ojibwe woman, Marguerite's mother. At age 19 Marguerite and Alexander McKay, a North West Company (NWC) clerk, started a family raising four children. After Alexander was killed on a trading expedition, Marguerite joined and eventually married Dr. John McLoughlin and had four children. They lived at NWC's Fort William near Lake Superior until transferred to develop Fort Vancouver, WA in 1824. There they served the needs of many needy Oregon Trail emigrants and NWC/Hudson Bay Co workers. They retired to Oregon City, OR in 1846 in a fine four-bedroom home and had moderate wealth and status as John was mayor, merchant, and mill owner.



In the 1840s Marguerite received a Chinese Chippendale-style sewing cabinet filled with carved sewing tools. Her home was a center for social activities in the community and her sewing cabinet would have been on display. The cabinet had a removable workbox and was fitted with special ivory pieces such as a pincushion

clamp, winding clamp, thimbles, needle cases, thread winders, netting rollers and ratchets, thread barrels, spool holders, tatting shuttles, thread spools, and intricately carved containers possibly for bead storage.





The well-preserved cabinet and items were donated to the Fort Vancouver National Historic Site Museum in 1947 by Marguerite's great-granddaughter. They

are on display in the original Oregon City McLoughlin home which was saved from demolition. It was recently repaired and refurbished with period appropriate décor. Tours and special handcraft

BRIGHT HOPES CHALLENGE

The results of our summer challenge surpassed even our wildest dreams. For those members who did contribute, be it 1 item or 20, thank you SO much. The committee can't continue to support Roy Maas Youth Alternative (RMYA) without your help. We received 134 completed quilts, 31 quilt tops which we will complete, and 94 totes and backbacks, all of which will go to RMYA to help a child in need feel loved by this community.

Because of quiet cash donations, the committee was able to add a grand prize winner. In addition, donations of books and quilting supplies helped us reward a number of our quilters.

AND THE WINNERS ARE......

Grand Prize winner is Janice Frankenberger. Janice donated 38 completed quilts and 33 totes.

1st prize for completed quilts goes to Ida Kujawski. Ida finished 23 nice sized quilts, at least 6 of which are Christmas themed.

1st prize for quilt tops goes to Sandra Lowell. Sandra donated 10 tops, 5 of which are Christmas themed and will be ready to go for Christmas.

1st prize for totes and backpacks has been won by Dea Jae Shore. Dea Jae finished 28 backpacks and totes for the kids at RMYA.

Thank you to each and every one of you who contributed to this challenge. Our work continues. Our goal of 100 Christmas quilts for the children at RMYA is well on its way to fruition. If you haven't yet sent a quilt, or a top, or a tote our way, please remember that the kids don't care if you've made mistakes, or used inexpensive material. Maybe there's a quilt in your closet you just don't like, or use, anymore. When a child has nothing and is in crisis, something made "for them" is priceless. Remember we have material, batting and kits available. We will figure out how to get these things to you if you decide that is a way for you to help. Our preferred size is about 52 x 60, but RMYA uses EVERY quilt, EVERY size that we bring to them. Christmas quilts will be accepted until Dec 1, although we happily accept any quilt all year long.

New Project for Guild Members

Introducing a new project for guild members to participate. Carolina Chain by Bonnie Hunter is the name of the quilt pattern. Except, because I am not fond of small size blocks, I'm changing the size of the strips to 2 1/2" and the size of the blocks to 6 1/2" unfinished.

So, I'm targeting those strips and pieces leftover from our Jelly Roll Celebration in September. These blocks only use TWO fabrics for each block. They need to be high contrast and small scale prints. For the main color you need 14 inches of fabric. For the contrasting chain pieces you need 7 1/2" of fabric. The revised version of these blocks are on the website and in this newsletter.

These blocks will be used to make a queen size quilt for the auction in September 2022. You can give your blocks to any of the finishing committee members— Ida Kujowski, Jean Hardies, Jeanette Jay, DeaJae Shore, Suellis Moore, Cindy Shutt, or me. We'll arrange to me you at one of the local quilt shops.

We need 72 of the dark blocks and 72 of the light blocks to make the top. Get your machine humming and use up those 2 1/2" strips!

Welcome new and returning members.


Hopefully, everyone enjoyed the Style Show that attended. A special thanks to Carol Bryant who chaired the committee and everyone who helped out.
