New Project for Guild Members

Introducing a new project for guild members to participate. Carolina Chain by Bonnie Hunter is the name of the quilt pattern. Except, because I am not fond of small size blocks, I'm changing the size of the strips to 2 1/2" and the size of the blocks to 6 1/2" unfinished.

So, I'm targeting those strips and pieces leftover from our Jelly Roll Celebration in September. These blocks only use TWO fabrics for each block. They need to be high contrast and small scale prints. For the main color you need 14 inches of fabric. For the contrasting chain pieces you need 7 1/2" of fabric. The revised version of these blocks are on the website and in this newsletter.

These blocks will be used to make a queen size quilt for the auction in September 2022. You can give your blocks to any of the finishing committee members — Ida Kujowski, Jean Hardies, Jeanette Jay, DeaJae Shore, Suellis Moore, Cindy Shutt, or me. We'll arrange to me you at one of the local quilt shops.

We need 72 of the dark blocks and 72 of the light blocks to make the top. Get your machine humming and use up those 2 1/2" strips!

2.2022 Pieces of the Past, 142: Scalamandre Silks, by Ellen Hernandez



Franco Scalamandre was from Naples, the son of a silk broker. After completing a doctorate in engineering, he immigrated to the US in 1923 during the Mussolini regime. After a few years as a drafter for Westinghouse Electric Company in New Jersey he and his wife Flora, a designer and painter, formed a weaving business on Long Island, Scalamandre Silks. They

focused on recreating historic fabrics for home furnishings. One of his first high profile clients was William Randolph Hearst who requested a silk and linen jacquard 'blue brocatelle.' Scalamandre opened a museum of textiles in New

York in 1936 which operated until the 1960s displaying over 600 of his fabric reproductions. Factory production changed during World War II to make parachute fabric, uniform braids and chevrons, and camouflage nets.






Two of Scalamandre's greatest accomplishments were the reproductions of Thomas Jefferson's original fabrics for Monticello and 19th century textiles for the Kennedy White House Blue Room, Red Room, and Green Room. Starting in the Hoover administration, Scalamandre donated all his expensive fabrics and wallpapers for the White House rooms. His stock continues to be used today for refurbishing when needed.

One of the most recognizable Scalamandre designs is running Red Zebras originally made for wallpaper. Sketched by Flora for the

Gino of Capri restaurant in the 1940s with a background to match spaghetti sauce, the design is still in demand. Zebra fabric costs about \$200/yard and

comes in red, blue, and brown. Zebra wallpaper

is available in eleven colors.



design fabrics, many at discount prices.)





Franco's daughter, Adriana, hid her name in a branch of this wallpaper design. She, her husband and four children continued operation of Scalamandre House after Franco's death in 1988. Raw silk imported from Brazilian and Chinese silk farms was processed in the mill. Passementerie (elaborate trims, fringes and edgings) and hand painted wallpapers were also completed at the mill.

In 2004 the Long Island factory closed and production moved to a computerized factory in South Carolina. Six of the vintage looms were stored for display in the National Museum of Industrial History under construction in Bethlehem, PA. These looms could only produce two to twenty yards per day compared to the computer looms making up

to 100 yards per day. Fabrics include jacquards, lampases, leathers, horsehair, sheers, and velvets. Since 2009 Louis Renzo and his sons Christopher and Louis have managed the textile house, along with Stark Fabric president Chad Stark. Lighting and furniture designs have been added to their inventory.
