Pieces of the Past, 150: 1938 Arkansas Signature Quilt, by Ellen Hernandez

Whoo-eee! This is number 150 of my researched articles, going back to February 2010. This month I am going to follow the rabbit hole down one of my own historical journeys. Enjoy.



In 2016 a faded, deteriorating signature guilt was given to me by a guild member who was aware of my interest in quilt history. She had purchased it in the 1980s in an Arkansas thrift shop and was ready to pass it on. Some fabrics were completely missing or faded, some fragile and splitting. What was most exciting about this quilt was the embroidered date "1938" and the twenty signatures (see label



below.) The pattern is a 1934 Kansas City Star Friendship Quilt. With no provenance of this quilt, I set out to discover its history, and determine the best way to preserve it.

I spent many hours searching family records online through sites such as ancestry.com and family search. Using the most unusual name, Fellie Sanderlin, I searched the 1930 and 1940 Census records. In 1940 Fellie was living in Michigan BUT was in Des Arc, Prairie CO, Arkansas in 1935. From there I searched all the names in or near Prairie CO in 1930 and 1940. I was able to narrow them all to Arkansas, most farm families, including "Lydia" who I believed to be Ora Walls' daughter. From there I moved forward to locate living descendants of the women and found grand/great-grandchildren of four of the quilters. They provided insight and information about the Johnson Chapel Community where the guilters probably met in the 1930s. Des Arc, a small town sixty miles east of Little Rock, suffered several severe floods in the early 1900s. Combined with the struggles of the Depression, these women most likely made utility quilts for each other, town families, and refugees escaping the floods. The surprising news is that some of the family members own other quilts similar to this one, and they hope to gather at the annual Johnson Chapel reunion and share their quilts and stories.

Stabilizing and repairing the quilt was laborious. With a herringbone hand stitch, I secured multiple areas where the fabrics were torn or splitting. The most difficult fabric to deal with was the light lavender lattice which was almost threadbare. After extensive searching I failed to find any close match, and even tried tinting vintage thin dishtowels, unsuccessfully. I used a combination of over-appliqueing a lavender/gray muslin and top-stitching lavender tulle over the most severely damaged strips. Several other examples of repair include:



Mrs. Hayley's completely faded fabric was covered with a light green tulle; Evelyn Campbell's disintegrated pink fabric was replaced with a vintage pink cotton; and I photocopied an intact piece of Lydia Wall's quilt to cover some damaged pieces. I hand stitched off-white tulle to the entire binding, and of course added a



label. Against my better judgement, I carefully soaked and air dried the quilt which resulted in some new tears and fading of my photocopied fabric and a replacement piece I had hand colored.



Where is the quilt now? As I had originally planned, I was able to return the quilt to descendants of the original quilters, and was successful in helping them set up a type of "Sisterhood of the Travelling 'Quilt.'" The first recipient, living near Des Arc, will keep the quilt and share it as families request, and then



will pass it on at the annual Johnson Chapel reunion held the first Saturday in May. It was both a challenge and a joy to work on this vintage treasure. It is still in poor condition, showing its age and well-loved use. Somehow, I feel close to the quilters, recalling their skills and generosity as I stitched where they had stitched over eighty years ago. Oh, and I wrote a booklet with many more details

Hello,

Our non-profit organization, Wrap Ukraine With Quilts, will be one of the featured charities at the Quilt Festival in Houston this year.

We would like all quilters in Texas to know that they can help Ukrainian refugees by bringing quilts to donate at our booth at the Festival.

### About our organization:

In March of this year, Gina Halladay and Beth Hawkins (both pattern designers in the quilt industry) began an effort to send quilts of comfort and warmth to the refugees flooding the borders from Ukraine. Now 6 months later, 10,000 quilts have been donated from all 50 states and Canada! Over 9,000 of those quilts have already been shipped and/or delivered to refugee mothers and children in various refugee centers, orphanages, and other housing locations in Poland, Moldova, Romania, and into the safer parts of Ukraine.



Each donated quilt is inventoried, tagged, and tracked to its destination. The quiltmaker can choose to leave their name and hometown, and a message of comfort to the recipient. The recipient can then scan the code on the tag, and send a message in return to the quiltmaker, through our website (email addresses are kept private). We post photos daily on our social media, showing the process of getting the quilts into the hands of refugees. Often quiltmakers can spot their quilts wrapped around a child or family in the photos that are posted!

Can you let your guild members know that they have a unique opportunity to drop off donated quilts if they are attending the Quilt Festival in Houston this year? We would greatly appreciate it! The need for warmth, comfort, and love from overseas is great, and with winter coming, we would like to increase our shipments of quilts for Ukrainian refugees!

- Handmade quilts of any size are needed.
   They can be quilted or tied. Fleece,
   crocheted, infant swaddle flannels are
   accepted too.
- Quilts can be registered on our website at <u>WrapUkraineWithQuilts.com</u> if the quiltmaker would like to send a personal message and tag their quilt before dropping off. (We can also do that for them in our booth).

Bradley returned to her roots in 2002 with her husband, John and son, Asher, in tow. She is best known as "The Wedding Planner" in these parts, through her professional event production company, Deborah Bradley Events & Designs, LLC. The Bradley Family welcomed their daughter, Railla, in 2005.

Deborah was elected to La Grange City Council and served for almost five years, served on the board of ARTS for Rural Texas and has authored four books.
