The need to shape and smooth fabric was the source of many inventions. The Chinese used hot metal for ironing well over a thousand years ago, as did the Koreans - though Koreans often used ironing sticks, too, beating the cloth rhythmically on stone. Archeologists discovered *'linen smoothers'* made of round, dark glass in many Viking women's graves. Other European cultures used stone, glass, bones, and wood for smoothing long before forged metal irons were created. A screw-press was introduced to Europe by the Romans. As the design developed, the press was a practical piece of furniture for storage.

The Scandinavians and Dutch carved elaborate mangle boards to smooth items larger than clothing, such as linens, on a wooden roller. A special mangle was often made by a groom for his bride. The oldest known mangle dates to 1566. Their design spread as far east as Russia.



Glass smoothers with handles were called slickers or slickstones and were standard pieces from the late Middle Ages to the 19th century. Often made of marble, they are a collector's item.



The first simple flat irons were forged by blacksmiths in the late Middle Ages. Two irons were required, one to be used while the other heated on a fire or stove. Other names for irons were *sadirons* from an old word meaning *solid*, and *goose* from the shape of the curved handle. Some irons were made of earthenware, terracotta, or soapstone. The hot handles had to be covered with pads or rags and after awhile removable wooden handles were created. Spitting on the iron was common to test for the desired temperature. It was a chore to keep the irons clean, rust free, and smooth to prevent damage to fabrics.



An improvement on the flat iron was the *ox-tongue, box* or *slug* iron. A chunk of metal was heated and then inserted into the iron body. Some of these slug irons could rotate on the handle and had a variety of surfaces, such as fluting and embossing for special tailoring. Charcoal could be inserted to hold heat longer if there were air holes in the iron. In India, burning coconut shells were used instead, and can still be found in use in areas where power outages are common.



Gas irons were next on the scene. Fuels consisted of kerosene, ethanol, whale oil, natural gas, carbide gas and gasoline. Coleman's gas iron was made in popular colors - blue, turquoise, red, green, and tan. Fuel irons sold well after World War II in areas that had not received electricity, and into the 1960s in parts of Canada and to the Amish. Henry Seely of New York patented the electric iron in 1882. Steam irons came in the 1950s.

Interesting Facts: The world's largest collection of irons is housed in Gochsheim Castle near Karlsruhe, Germany. There is an international Pressing Iron and Trivet Collectors of America club that has an annual convention and a quarterly newsletter; Info@PressingIronAndTrivetCollectors.org. Two detailed books about irons are *Show and Tell* by Ton van der Tonnekreek and *Even More Irons By Irons* by David Irons.


