8.2023 Pieces of the Past, 160: **Umbrellas**, by Ellen Hernandez



It seems to be *raining* hand crafted umbrellas (from the Latin ‘umbra’ meaning to shade) all across the country. Art classes and workshops are available for kids and adults to design their own creative umbrellas. Quilters especially enjoy mixing designer fabrics and adding decorative appliques to their umbrellas. These weather covers - umbrellas for rain and parasols for sun - are not new, dating to early Egypt, Greece, and China 4,000 years ago. Perhaps you can picture parasol type fans made of palm leaves, papyrus, or peacock feathers being held over pharaohs from vintage



Hollywood Egyptian movies.

The Chinese used bamboo sticks for frames and waxed and lacquered paper parasols to provide rain protection. Besides paper, covers were made of leather, cloth, or silk. A collapsible umbrella is mentioned in the *Book of Han* dating to 21 AD. There are records referring to parasols across the globe from Persia (ancient Iran) to other Asian countries.



The Italian Catholic church had an ‘*umbraculum*’ as part of the papal regalia to provide shade for the pope in the 1200s. There are almost no references to parasols or umbrellas in Europe during the Middle Ages. In the 1600s European umbrellas influenced by China and India were made with wooden rods or whalebone. In 1710 Jean Marius of Paris developed a lightweight folding umbrella to replace the typical ones that weighed about eleven pounds. In 1750 writer Jonas Hanway of London carried an umbrella with him everywhere and his habit caught on with so

many English gentlemen that any man carrying an umbrella at that time was called a ‘Hanway.’ A stronger yet lightweight steel-ribbed umbrella was invented in 1852 by Samuel Fox based on women’s corsets of the day. Robert W. Patten is credited with the first umbrella hat around 1890,



a useful item he designed while prospecting in Mexico. Much like something from a Bond movie, umbrella handles were made to store items such as daggers, flasks, and pillboxes. Handles were also an artform with beautiful designs in ivory, silver, bamboo, and leather.



Due to needing a cane in one hand, German Hans Haupt wanted a small umbrella he didn’t have to hold, one that he could put in his pocket. In 1928 he invented the collapsible umbrella called ‘Knirps’ or *little guy*. The Knirps Company continues to be a top umbrella designer now based in Austria. They introduced the automatic umbrella in 1965 and added outdoor umbrellas in 2013.

Umbrellas have been used in a variety of situations, from photography lighting to the 2014 Hong Kong *Umbrella Revolution* protests. Many people can recall Mary Poppins



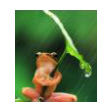
being blown by the wind with her opened umbrella, or the sword-umbrella fighting in *The Avengers* television series. Umbrellas and parasols have been depicted in art through the ages - a Madonna painting in 1530 by dai Libri, Renoir, Monet, and Manet in the late 1800s, and even modern street art such as this plaza area in Mauritius.



Most umbrellas today have fiberglass or aluminum structure with Teflon coated nylon fabrics. Wayne Hemmingway designed an umbrella made from recycled soda bottles. Other inventions include Smart umbrellas that text you weather reports and drone umbrellas that follow over you.



Want to make your own personalized umbrella? You’ll need a frame kit (about \$25 online), two to three yards of quilting cotton or nylon, umbrella pattern (\$12-\$15), water proofing spray, velcro and basic sewing supplies. Enjoy!

LA GRANGE, TEXAS—August 28, 2023—Two groundbreaking exhibits of quilts will be on display at the Texas Quilt Museum from **August 31-December 23, 2023.**

First, we'll pay tribute to the wildly popular series of books by **James Herriot** as well as the recent smash PBS series with the animal-themed juried show "**All Creatures Great and Small.**" And we'll also dip into the amazing archives of quilt collectors and dealers **Mary and Joe Koval** with "**Antique Quilts from the Koval Collection.**"

All Creatures Great and Small

James Herriot was the pen name for the real-life British country veterinary surgeon James Wight (1916-1995). He wrote a series of best-selling books about his experiences in the field, as well as short stories for adults and children. They've been adapted into several TV shows and films, including the most recent *All Creature Great and Small* series that began in 2020 and runs on PBS in the United States.

There are also quilts on endangered species that will raise your awareness to their plight."

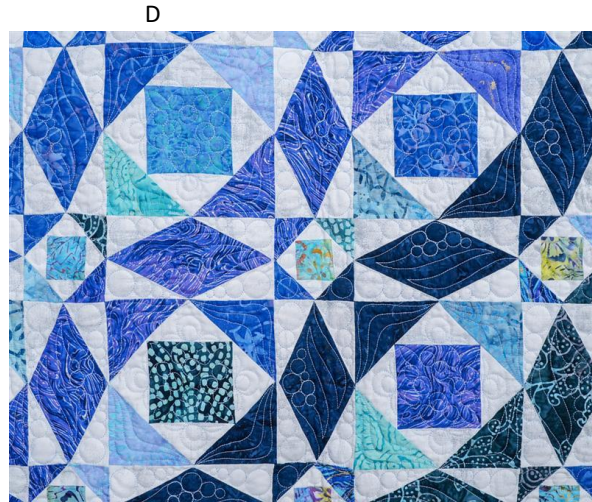

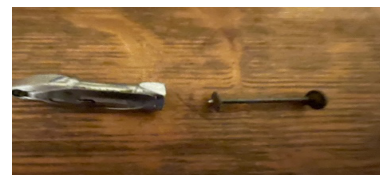
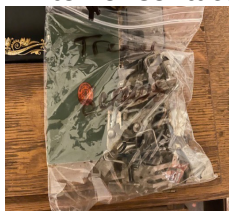
