FRIDAY, AUG 9 WORKSHOP - BUTTERFLY BOUQUET with CHERYL MATZEN



Class Description: Butterfly Bouquet

This class is for people who like to get down to business and try new things. You may discover that things that look difficult, like the quilt center, are really very easy. And, it may just put your own creative juices on overdrive. This is a great **skill-building** class for those with intermediate or expert skills. Beginners are welcome also.

- Learn how to make the 36 perfect 2-inch HSTs in less than an hour using Cheryl's invention, the HSTSystem stencil. It's fast, fun and easy. And you get to try it before you buy.
- Learn a **fast and very easy** water-soluble fusible paper technique to make perfect applique motifs for machine or hand applique.
- Receive the precut water-soluble fusible paper butterfly motifs to complete your project.
- Learn the *straight setting* method to achieve perfect points and aligned straight seams every time.
- Use the *sew then cut* method to make the fun and whimsical wave block border.
- Learn a fast and easy method for cutting and sewing bias-binding strips.
- Receive an online version of the project pattern.
- But wait, there's more ...

FABRIC REQUIREMENTS

- ☐ **1 yard** — Background: (off white or off-white texture):
- ☐ **3/4 yard** — Small Floral
- ☐ **2 yards** — Light Turquoise Blue: (1 yard is used for the top and binding; use remainder for backing)
- ☐ **Fat Quarter** — Dark Blue
- ☐ **5" Square** — Black

WHAT TO EXPECT

You should have a good working knowledge of your sewing machine and quilting tools, i.e., rotary cutters, rulers, etc. Minimal exceptions are made for beginners. There will be a demo for quick and easy cutting and sewing bias binding strips. If time permits, you will learn how to hide those hand-appliquéd stitches.

MOST IMPORTANT

All fabrics for the class project should be pre-cut before class. See Cutting Instructions on page 2. **Please do not attempt to cut your fabrics during class.** Double check your supply list before leaving home. Once all of that is done, you can expect to just have a fun and successful quilting day!

SUPPLY CHECKLIST

In addition to your sewing machine, sewing thread, scissors and your favorite tools and notions, the list below includes the recommended supplies needed for your success:

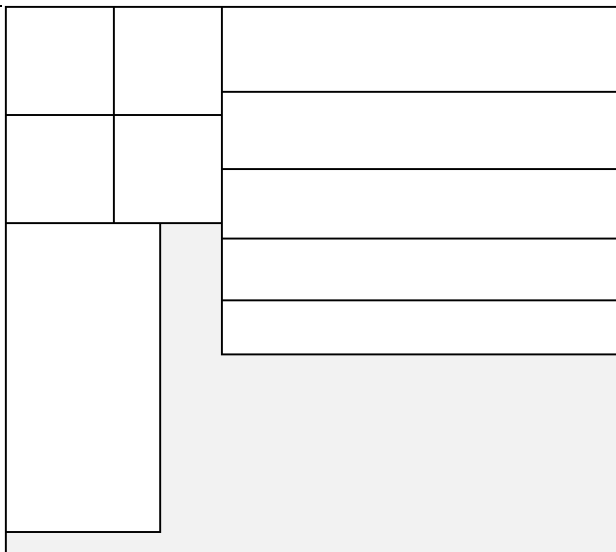
- ☐ Pounce Pad with iron off white chalk (There will be a pounce pad to try and use in class before you buy.)
- ☐ HST250 stencil (There will be a stencil to try and use in class before you buy.)
- ☐ Turntable rotary cutting mat, or a small mat that is easily turned on the table surface
- ☐ 6.5" × 6.5" ruler
- ☐ 15" to 18" long ruler
- ☐ 45mm or 60mm rotary cutter with a sharp blade for squaring and cutting
- ☐ Small Iron and Ironing Mat
- ☐ Silicone pressing mat or parchment parchment
- ☐ Washable Gluestick
- ☐ Seam ripper (just in case)
- ☐ Stelitto
- ☐ Mechanical or #2 Pencil, or Washable Fabric Marker
- ☐ Applique thread to match butterfly fabrics (YLI 60wt. cotton [preferred], silk, or Superior Bottomline) No. 10,11, or straw applique needle (needle size is your preference)
- ☐ Comfortable thimble

NOTE: It is always a good idea to bring extra sewing machine needles, an extra filled bobbin, and any extra fabrics left over after cutting.

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS

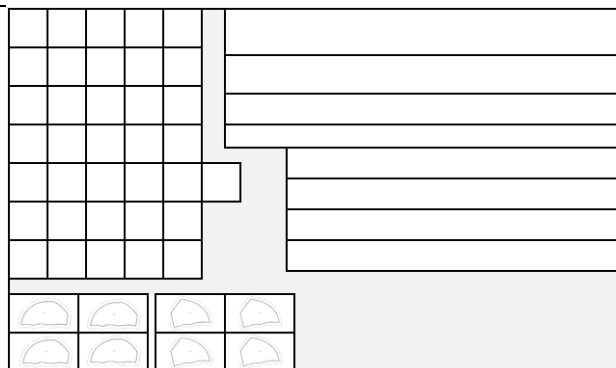
Background Fabric: of-white or off-white texture

- ☐ Cut 4: 7" × 7 squares
- ☐ Cut 1: 10" × 20" square
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 5.5" (label this strip A)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 5" (label this strip B)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 4.5" (label this strip C)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 4" (label this strip D)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 3.5" (label this strip E)



Small Floral: or any small print you like

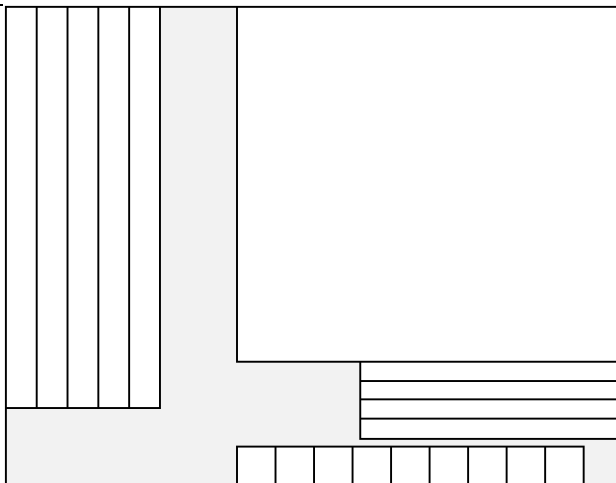
- ☐ Cut 36: 2.5" × 2.5 squares
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 3" (label this strip E)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 2.5" (label this strip D)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 2" (label this strip C)
- ☐ Cut 1: 26" × 1.5" (label this strip B)
- ☐ Cut 4: 22" × 2.25" strips
- ☐ Cut 2: 5" × 10" rectangles (large butterfly wings)



Light Turquoise Blue:

- ☐ Cut 5: 26" × 2"
- ☐ Cut 9: 2.5" × 2.5 squares
- ☐ Cut 4: 18" × 1.25"
- ☐ Cut 1: 24" × 24" (Binding)

Use the remainder of fabric yardage for backing.



Dark Blue:

- ☐ Cut 1: 10" × 20" square
- ☐ Cut 2: 5" × 10" rectangles (small butterfly wings)

Black: Cut 1: 5" × 5" square (Butterfly Body)

FRIDAY, SEPT 12 WORKSHOP - FOUNDATION PAPER PIECING 101 with DANA JONES



Introduction to Foundation Paper Piecing (FPP)

Description:

Extreme angles, perfectly matched points, fun images of animals and flowers, and more, much more are all easy to do with foundation paper piecing (FPP). You'll learn the basics of this versatile and precise technique as you create blocks for a quick-to-piece table runner. It's as simple as sewing on the lines.

Supply List

Fabric: You'll need five fabrics for this quilt: four for the blocks and one for the inside border. You'll need the following amount of each fabric:

- Fabric 1 (red with green and yellow leaves): $\frac{3}{4}$ yards
- Fabric 2 (green with gold dots): 1 yard
- Fabric 3 (yellow): $\frac{1}{2}$ yard
- Fabric 4 (red with green and yellow squares): $\frac{1}{4}$ yard (fat quarter or regular quarter)
- Fabric 5 (green): $\frac{1}{4}$ yard (regular quarter only)
- Backing: $1\frac{3}{8}$ yards. If long-arming: $1\frac{5}{8}$ yards
- Binding: $\frac{3}{8}$ yards

This includes the pattern for the class, several additional handouts and foundations for the table runner printed on foundation paper.

Holiday Bingo Blocks

courtesy of the Coastal Prairie Quilt Guild of Texas

- You create your own BINGO “cards” using 2.5” squares of fabric.
- Each “card” has 25 squares, five vertical columns and five horizontal rows.
- The fabrics going down are all the same color but *not* the same fabric.
- The five vertical columns should be in the following colors -
- Red, Blue, Green, Yellow, Purple
- The columns can be in any order of color across the “card”.
- There are fourteen patterns of fabrics that can be used:
 - Batik
 - Dot
 - Floral
 - Geometric
 - Heart
 - Holiday
 - Leaf
 - Metallic
 - Novelty
 - Paisley
 - Plaid
 - Reproduction i.e. Civil War, 1930s, etc.
 - Solid
 - Stripe

The center square should always be black on each “card”.

It is the pattern on the fabric that is more important than the color so as an example a bit of green on a square in the orange column is okay.

You will need to bring buttons or beans or poker chips to use as markers.

You may play as many “cards” as you have space for.

Once a pattern is called and you have marked it, you cannot change it.

Do not make all your “cards” the same since only one “card” per person can win a game.

There will be prizes.

If you have extra 2.5” squares bring them as a donation.

The “cards” will be given to Bright Hopes or Quilt Projects Finishing Committee.

Dear Fellow Quilters,

The Bright Hopes committee collects donations of quilt tops, fabric, completed quilts and tote bags. Each month we donate 10 large quilts and 15 tote bags to the Roy Maas Youth Alternatives or RMYA. RMYA is an organization that provides support and clinical services to children and young adults who have gone through severe trauma and neglect. When the children and young adults arrive at RMYA, they are given a quilt, clothing, and toiletries in the tote bags that we donate. We need to make the tote bags large enough to fit these items. The Bright Hopes committee provides tote bag kits that are cut to the appropriate size to fit all the items that they will give the children or young adult adults.

If you choose to make tote bags from your own fabric, they should be at least 24 inches wide by 22 inches deep when finished. They should have these three items sewn on the outside:

1. A large pocket on one side
2. A Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild label and motivational sayings fabric sewn on the opposite side, also on the outside.

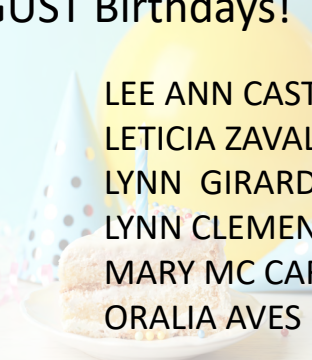
Please do not add any beads or sequins that a child may pull off and swallow. Also, for safety reasons, please double check your finished work for straight pins or needles. We have been finding several pins lately. If you have pets, please make sure to clean your finished work with a lint brush. Some children might have allergies to pet hair or pet dander.

If you make quilt tops, they should be between 50 to 60 inches wide and 70 to 75 inches long. We would like some quilts oriented for girls and some for boys and they should be non-religious. We will deliver Christmas themed quilts to RMYA in early December. If you have a favorite pattern, you may start it now so we can get it all quilted and bound early. The deadline for collecting all the Christmas quilts is the **November 8, 2025** quilt guild meeting.

Thank you for all the wonderful ways that you donate your time, talents, and efforts. We really appreciate your help.

Monthly Spotlight President Pro Tem Dea Jae Shore



Dea Jae Shore, President Pro Tem, has this month's Spotlight. In, Dea Jae's role as President Pro Tem, her primary responsibility is to serve as presiding officer in the absence of our President, Melissa Allo. But do you know about all of the roles and responsibilities Dea Jae has? There are many! To say that Dea Jae is busy is quite the understatement.

Dea Jae hooks up the technology and equipment for each guild meeting. She is responsible for scheduling and running the zoom meeting for the board meetings, guild meetings, and every other zoom meeting on the guild calendar. Dea Jae is also our Webmaster. Her job as Webmaster requires indepth technical expertise and knowledge in order to manage and maintain our guild website and software licensing. And she also manages the guild Dropbox which contains guild documents and our membership database, both current and historical. Dea Jae takes action on every request to upload documents to the website, make webpage updates, and to address issues that may arise regarding the website, Dropbox, or software.

8.2025 Pieces of the Past, 183: **BigNik** by Ellen Hernandez

My idyllic summertime picnic would include a straw basket filled with my grandmother's crispy fried chicken, potato salad, fresh-from-her-garden strawberries, home canned bread and butter pickles, chocolate layer cake, and sweet ice tea spread out on a red and white checked tablecloth. And no ants, please. I fondly remember relaxed picnic trips to the local lakes in northern Florida when I was young, returning home after a day of cool, wet relief from the hot summer sun with a full belly and a sunburned nose. First one in the shower got the first nap. I discovered a modern picnic version of interest in Switzerland ...

St. Gallen, Switzerland has been known for the production of textiles, particularly linen, since the Middle Ages. Linen production employed hundreds of people from planting flax, spinning, weaving, bleaching, and finishing the cloth referred to as 'White Gold.' It was traded all over the world and brought great prosperity to the Swiss region. Linen trade decreased in the 18th century and the St. Gallen region refocused with cotton processing and luxury embroidery that is still in demand today.



Just as linen was historically laid out on fields to bleach in the sun, the performance artist twins, Frank and Patrik Riklin, annually lay out their *BigNik* sometime between June and September. They have been collecting red and white fabric squares since 2012 to display as a giant picnic cloth named BigNik. The red and white colors were chosen by the Riklins as a reminder of the tablecloths used by their grandmother when serving dinner. The brothers' idea is to highlight their home area in the Swiss Alps between St. Gallen, Appenzell and Lake Constance. Their goal is to continue to collect fabric to reach the size of 100 football fields, by 2040. Each 55-inch square of the picnic rug will represent one member of the local population or 286,478 pieces. Many fabrics are included such as pieces from curtains, sheets, and towels. They are sewn together by volunteers across the country into two groups, with four pieces of white and four pieces of red. Velcro fasteners are sewn to the corners to join the BigNik. Farmers mow their fields to prepare for the display. Any buildings or trees are simply incorporated in the layout. Afterwards, the community celebrates with a picnic, of course. Afterwards, everyone helps separate and fold the squares which are then stored in a warehouse until the next display.



In 2022 the Cedar Rapids, Iowa Visual Arts Commission proposed a similar BigNik project as part of their Public Art Plan. At that time, they already had 79 public artworks displayed about the city.

FYI: The largest picnic in the world of 22,232 people was set in 2009 in Lisbon, Portugal. People were bussed in, counted, and enjoyed an afternoon in the Parque da Bela Vista.

UPDATE: Pres. Macron and P.M. Starmer made a deal in July to loan **The Bayeux Tapestry** (see archived Oct 2011 article) to London's British Museum while the French Bayeux Museum undergoes two years of renovations.

History in the Making

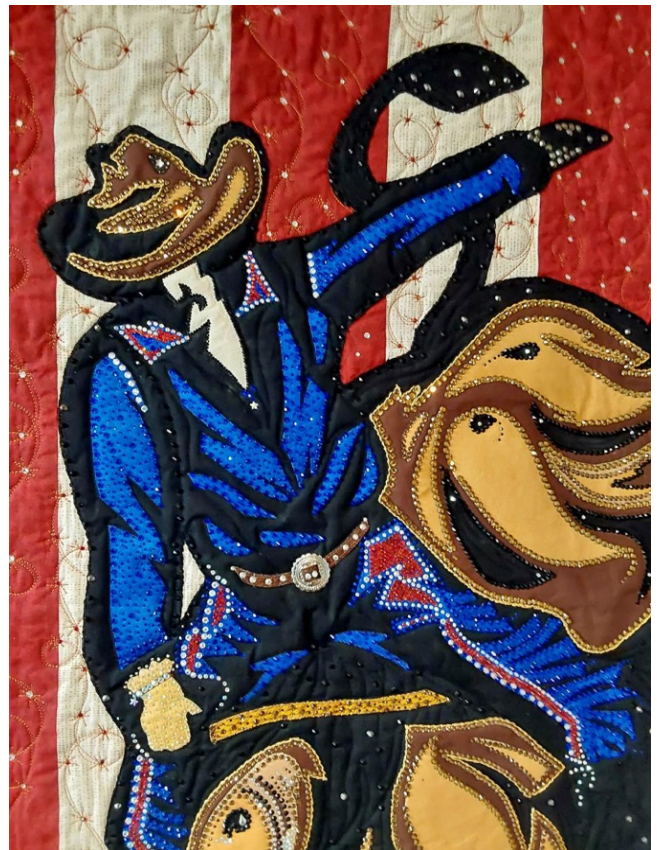
New exhibits Feature Texas Traditions, Marvelous Medallions, and the Spirit of Reenergizing Renewal!

LA GRANGE, TEXAS—April 28, 2025—Saddle up and get ready to head to the Texas Quilt Museum for the debut of three brand new exhibits this spring and summer!

Visitors will enjoy *Blue Ribbon Prizewinners from the 2025 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, Framed Center/Medallion Quilts, and Rebound-Renew-Reimagine*. They will run from **May 1-August 23**.

Blue Ribbon Prizewinners from the 2025 Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo will feature 14 quilts from the Adult Division and six quilts from the Youth Division.

All hung on display for hundreds of thousands of visitors to see and enjoy at this year's HLSR, one of the city's marquee events. **The exhibit is sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo.**

"These works confirm that the art of quilting is still very much alive in Texas, celebrating both the rich history of the art form and the applications of many traditional techniques and styles into contemporary quilts," says Vicki Mangum, Museum Curator. "You'll be impressed by the workmanship and beauty of these winners!"

Be sure to see the Adult Best of Show winner, *Hankie Panky* by Anita Todd of the Colorado Valley Quilt Guild, and the Youth Best of Show winner, *Midnight Blooms* by Ellie Stuckey. There will also be a display of Rodeo-related art from students at La Grange High School.

Framed Center/Medallion Quilts showcases 45 works from the American Quilt Study Group. In the 2021 Biennial Quilt Study, AQSG members were challenged to study a Medallion quilt and create their own original work inspired by it. The "inspiration" quilts range from the 18th-20th centuries. Some of the new quilts might be mistaken for the originals, while others are a fresh take on a classic look.

"Framed or Medallion quilts have been a favorite of quilters for over 200 years. It's lovely to see contemporary interpretations of these classic Medallion quilts, especially in a manageable size." Mangum adds. **This exhibit is sponsored by the Lucille Gaebler Klein Fund.**

Finally, **Rebound-Renew-Reimagine** displays 19 quilts from the Manhattan Quilters Guild. For many members, the enforced isolation of the Covid-19 pandemic had brought deep reflection and new experimentation with previous techniques and materials. The decision was made to create quilts with titles that begin with a "re," which often carries such meanings as "again and again" and suggests a look backward while moving forward.

"Open yourself to the art that these quilts possess. Some artists included are Ludmilla Aristova, Rachael Dorr, Paula Nadelstern, and Victoria Findlay Wolfe," Mangum says. "This show demonstrates the power of hard times in the hands of dedicated artists. They translated their experiences of loss and grief and separation into artwork that makes us feel revived."

GREATER SAN ANTONIO QUILT GUILD, INC ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM

MISSION

The Greater San Antonio Quilt Guild (GSAQG) has established a grant program in honor of a loved and esteemed founding member, Ethel Y. Howey, whose accomplishments and influence extended into the international quilt world. The grant is to encourage the pursuit of education in the study of quilt making and to recognize the importance of quilting in today's society as an art form, as an instrument of healing, as part of our legacy, and as a common thread which binds all in friendship.

PURPOSE

The purpose of the grant program is to fund projects that will have long term impact on preserving the heritage and further the art of quilt making. The grant may be used to cover expenses such as fees (including conferences, workshops, etc.), travel, lodging, meals, materials, and books. The grant(s) will be awarded in even numbered years, not to exceed \$2,000. The Grant Committee may divide the monies between more than one recipient. The GSAQG is not obligated to award the entire \$2,000 or any part thereof, if the quality of the proposals does not merit it.

ELIBILITY

- Applicant must be an active GSAQG member in good standing for the previous **two (2) years** immediately preceding the grant deadline.
- An applicant must show evidence of an interest in continuing to improve and innovate in the field of quilt design, construction, history, or technique.
- Financial need will NOT be a criterion for selection.
- Grant recipients are ineligible to reapply for grants for four years. Grant committee members are ineligible for grants while serving on the committee.

PROCEDURES AND DEADLINES

- Applications must be submitted **on or before August 1** (current year), and the grant will be awarded at the following January Guild meeting.
- If the recipient fails to fulfill the requirements or is unable to attend the proposed project or program, the grant money must be returned within **three (3) months** of the cancellation, or on a timeline agreed to by the committee and the applicant. If an alternate applicant is available, the money may be transferred to the alternate with approval of the committee.
- Recipients must be willing and able to share with GSAQG the new skills, techniques, or information gained. This may be in the form of a presentation, a workshop, or other process that disseminates the information to the members in **the year following receipt of the grant**. Scheduling must be coordinated with the 1st Vice President for Programs.
- If a workshop or program is being presented, **at a minimum of three (3) months before** the scheduled Guild workshop or program, a lesson plan and class sample will be presented to the Ethel Y. Howey Chairperson, the 1st Vice President for Programs, and one Guild member-at-large.
- Recipient must submit, in writing, a final report of the project and expenses **by March 1** of the year following receipt of the grant.

GSAQG ETHEL Y. HOWEY GRANT PROGRAM APPLICATION PROCESS

Following the stated timeline, submit a typed or handwritten application, not to exceed two (2) pages. Include the date, your name, address, phone numbers, email, number of years a GSAQG member, and explain:

1. Why you would like to receive this grant.
2. How you will use the grant funds, including a specific budget.
3. How you will share your new skills, techniques, and information with the membership.

One MISSION of GSAQG

- To stimulate an interest in quilts and to advance the art of quiltmaking.

Recognizing the importance of active participation in quilt guild events and activities, Ida Blankenship Kujawski has provided funds to establish a Scholarship Account. This scholarship fund will enable guild members to apply for financial assistance to cover fees for workshops and retreats, further encouraging engagement and skill development within our community.

PURPOSE

- Enhance Guild Membership Experience: Foster greater enjoyment of guild membership by promoting skill development and friendships through active participation in guild activities.
- Encourage Participation: Motivate members to attend workshops and retreats, enhancing their skills and connections within the guild.
- Financial Support: Provide financial assistance to members who may be on a tight budget, helping to alleviate the costs associated with workshops and retreats.
- Establish a Donation Fund: Create a Scholarship Fund that can receive additional donations in the future. These donations can come from anyone for various reasons, further supporting the guild's activities and members.

ELIGIBILITY

- Applicant must be active member of GSAQG for the (1) year preceding the date of the event.
- Special consideration to "First-time attendee"
- Scholarships for guild workshops and retreats are available each year. Workshop required kit fee provided by instructor could be included in Scholarship amount.
- Guild Workshops offered as 2 sessions (Friday/Saturday) would qualify for two scholarships, to help two members.
- One scholarship per member in a calendar year.
- Scholarship recipients are ineligible to reapply for:
 - 3 years for Winter or Summer Retreat
 - 2 years for Mini-Retreats
 - 2 years for Guild Speakers' workshops

Paper copy of Applications available by chair at onset of enrollment.
